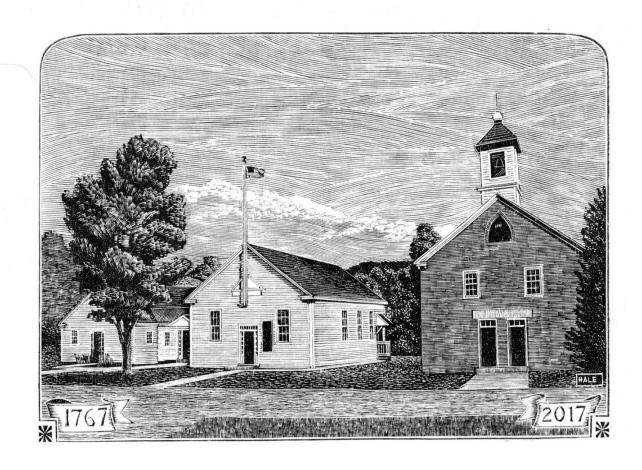

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Nelson Nelson, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2016, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, which includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson, as of December 31, 2016, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, and the budgetary comparison statement for the General Fund, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the pension related schedules on pages 25 and 26 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's response to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Town of Nelson has not presented a management's discussion and analysis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined that the management's discussion and analysis is necessary to supplement, but is not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Nelson's basic financial statements as a whole. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. They are the responsibility of management and were derived from, and relate directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Date: Tuesday March 13, 2018 Voting for Election of officers and Ballot Questions

Time: Polls to open at 11:00 AM and close at 7:00 PM

Location: Nelson Town Hall

Details: Business meeting will be held on Saturday March 17, 2018 at 10:00 AM

Location: Nelson Town Hall

Article 01: Choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing

To Choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

This article appears on the Official Ballot.

Article 02: To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$896,954 for general municipal operations of Town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$240,600. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 03: Support of Town Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,158 for the support of the Town library, \$32,167 to be raised by taxes and \$5,991 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 04: Funding of various social service agencies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,502 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$1,500), Home Health Care Services (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$911), Southwestern Community Services (\$500), Monadnock Region child Advocacy Center (\$1,000), Hundred Nights Inc. (\$500), MCVP Crisis & Prevention Center (\$441), The Samaritans, Inc. (\$250), and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2017, \$5,061 was paid in support of social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$38,238 in food, services and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend these article 3-0.

Article 05: Repair, clean and restore damaged headstones

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to repair, clean and restore damaged headstones in the Nelson and Munsonville cemeteries. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 06: Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$84,039. The Selectmen Recommend this article 3-0.

Article 07: Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$169,092. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 08: Add funds to Milfoil Prevention and Treatment Expendable Trust

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$28.307. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 09: Funding for fighting forest fires with anticipated reimbursement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This sum to come as reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden and no amount will be raised through taxation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 10: Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$15,331. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 11: Add funds to Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$59,778. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 12: Fund special patrols or details performed by Nelson Police

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. The total sum to come from offsetting grants and/or revenues received for said patrols and details and no amount to be raised through taxation. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 13: Add funds to Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The Selectmen are the agents to expend said funds. The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$10,083. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 14: Purchase of Forest Firefighting equipment

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the purchase of Forest Firefighting equipment. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 15: Purchase and installation of 3 Dry Hydrants

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purchase and installation of 3 Dry Hydrants (2 new and 1 replacement). The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 16: Purchase a new Firefighting Pumper/Tanker Truck

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$422,381 for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new Firefighting Pumper/Tanker Truck, and to authorize the withdrawal of up to \$50,000 from the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$372,381 to come from anticipated offsetting funds from a Federal Grant for that purpose. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2017 was approximately \$169,092. It being understood that neither the Pumper/Tanker purchase or withdrawal of Capital Reserve funds will occur unless the Grant is awarded to the Town of Nelson. This article is non-lapsing until December 31, 2019. The Nelson Fire and Rescue Department and the Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee support this article. The Fire Chief recommends this article. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Articles By Petition

Article 17: By Petition - Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,950 for the Game of Village Inc., a non-profit 501(c)3 organization, to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2018 - a summer learning experience. All children who live in Nelson and are entering 5th-8th grades may attend. This is a "Petitioned Article". The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

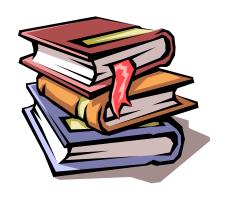

TOWN MEETING MINUTES MARCH 14 & 18, 2017

The election portion of our Town meeting was held during a raging blizzard that resulted in 18" of snow and 2 to 4 feet of snow drifts. The moderator, Lew Derby was left with the decision whether to postpone because of weather or to continue with the traditional voting day of the 2_{nd} Tuesday of March. In spite of weather reports advising people to stay at home, the governor announced that the elections should not be postponed. Mr. Derby heeded this warning. The polls opened at 11 am and closed at 7 pm. We had an amazing turnout of 135 hardy Nelson voters arrive at the Town Hall to cast their vote. This was 65 less than the previous year, which was very good considering the horrendous weather.

Article 02: Amend Zoning Ordinances

To see if the Town will vote to make the following amendments and additions to the Nelson Zoning Ordinances to become effective on June 1, 2017. (The Nelson Planning Board proposes these amendments and additions to the Nelson Zoning Ordinances in order to make them compliant with the intent of newly enacted NH RSA's 674:71, 674:72, and 674:73, all of which will become effective on June 1, 2017.)

Change 3:5 from:

3:5 Each additional dwelling unit (whether contained in the same building, or separate), will require an additional two acres of land, plus an additional 50 feet of road frontage on a Class V or better road.

- 3:5 Each additional detached dwelling unit will require an additional two acres of land, plus an additional 50 feet of road frontage on a Class V or better road.
- 3:5.1 Neither additional road frontage nor additional lot area shall be required for an Accessory Dwelling Unit, as defined in Article 5:5, that is designed and constructed in compliance with Article 5:5 of this Ordinance.

Change 3:6 from:

3:6 Lots of less than five acres must possess at least 200 feet of frontage on a Class V or better road. Additional dwelling units per lot shall each require an additional 50 feet of frontage on a Class V or better road.

To:

- 3:6 Lots of less than five acres must possess at least 200 feet of frontage on a Class V or better road. Additional detached dwelling units per lot shall each require an additional 50 feet of frontage on a Class V or better road.
- 3:6.1 Additional road frontage shall not be required for an Accessory Dwelling Unit, as defined in Article 5:5, that is designed and constructed in compliance with Article 5:5 of this Ordinance.

Change 3:7 from:

3:7 All proposed development shall incorporate the principles of good design and land use. The amount of frontage along a Class V or better road may be less than 200 feet provided that: It is a condition of the subdivision, and so stipulated on the plat that only one dwelling unit may be constructed on the entire lot;

No more than two lots having less than 200 feet of road frontage are created, either in one subdivision, or from land previously subdivided in this manner;

The minimum lot sizes and setbacks are provided per the table below. Additionally, in this situation, the total area of the lot(s) with less than 200 feet of frontage must be at least five acres, and it shall be stipulated as a condition of the subdivision (and on the plat) that no more than one dwelling unit is constructed on the lot.

To: 3:7 All proposed development shall incorporate the principles of good design and land use. The amount of frontage along a Class V or better road may be less than 200 feet provided that: It is a condition of the subdivision, and so stipulated on the plat that only one dwelling unit and one Accessory Dwelling Unit, as defined in Article 5:5, that is designed and constructed in compliance

with Article 5:5 of this Ordinance, may be constructed on the entire lot;

No more than two lots having less than 200 feet of road frontage are created, either in one subdivision, or from land previously subdivided in this manner;

The minimum lot sizes and setbacks are provided per the table below.

Additionally, in this situation, the total area of the lot(s) with less than 200 feet of frontage must be at least five acres, and it shall be stipulated as a condition of the subdivision (and on the plat) that no more than one dwelling unit and one Accessory Dwelling Unit, as defined in Article 5:5, that is designed and constructed in compliance with Article 5:5 of this Ordinance, may be constructed on the lot.

Change 3:10 from:

3:10 An additional dwelling unit shall require an additional 50 feet of shore frontage if the additional dwelling is setback more than 250 feet from the shoreline. If the additional dwelling is setback more than 100 feet but less than 250 feet from the shoreline, an additional 150 feet of shore frontage is required.

To.

3:10 An additional detached dwelling unit shall require an additional 50 feet of shore frontage if the additional detached dwelling is set back more than 250 feet from the shoreline. If the additional detached dwelling is setback more than 100 feet but less than 250 feet from the shoreline, an additional 150 feet of shore frontage is required.

3:10.1 Additional shore frontage shall not be required for an Accessory Dwelling Unit as defined in

Article 5:5, that is designed and constructed in compliance with article 5:5 of this Ordinance. Add:

Article 5:5. Accessory Dwelling Units

5:5.1 Definitions: As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meaning indicated:

Accessory Dwelling Unit. An "Accessory Dwelling Unit" (or "ADU") is a residential living unit that is

within or attached to a single-family dwelling, and that provides independent living facilities for one or

more persons, including provisions for sleeping, eating, cooking, and sanitation on the same parcel of

land as the principal dwelling unit it accompanies.

Lot Coverage. The percentage determined by dividing (a) the area of a lot covered by the total (in

square feet) of: (1) the footprint of the main building; and (2) the footprints of accessory buildings and

(3) parking pads and driveways; by (b) the gross area of the lot.

5:5.2. Provisions

An Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) shall be permitted in all zoning districts that permit single family

dwellings. All of the following criteria must be met in order for the Select Board to approve the

construction of an Accessory Dwelling Unit.

A. Only one (1) ADU shall be permitted for each single-family dwelling. The application for the building permit for the ADU must certify that the structure is to be used as an ADU and clearly identify

its size and its location relative to the boundaries of the property. The certification, that the structure

is an ADU, shall be recorded at the Registry of Deeds upon approval of the building permit.

B. Either the ADU or the principal dwelling unit shall be the principal residence and legal domicile of

the owner of the property.

C. The ADU must provide independent living facilities for one or more persons containing the four

elements of sleeping, eating, cooking, and sanitation and comply with all State standards for water

supply and sewage disposal. See Section 5:5.2 H.

D. The ADU shall have an independent means of ingress and egress, or shall have ingress and

egress through a common space such as a shared hallway to an exterior door.

- E. The ADU shall be attached to the principal dwelling unit. In order to be considered an attached ADU there must be a common wall, with a connecting door, between the principal dwelling unit and the ADU.
- F. The habitable floor area of the ADU shall not exceed 800 square feet.
- G. An ADU shall be provided with a minimum of one (1) off-street parking space.
- H. An ADU shall make provision for adequate water supply and sewage disposal service in compliance with RSA 485-A:38 and regulations adopted by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services.
- I. Lot Coverage for all properties, both those with and those without ADU's shall not exceed 25%
- 5:5.3 Minimum Lot Dimension Requirements: An attached ADU shall not be required to meet additional lot area requirements other than already provided for the principal dwelling unit. An ADU shall comply with all lot setback requirements.
- 5:5.4 Discontinuance: A property owner shall notify the Board of Selectmen in writing of discontinuance of an Accessory Dwelling Unit, including by reason of the failure of the property owner to reside on the property as a principal residence and domicile. The failure of the property owner to maintain the right to use an Accessory Dwelling Unit shall be a violation of the zoning Ordinance for

which the Board of Selectmen shall have all the rights and remedies under RSA 676 and the Zoning Ordinance.

The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article Passed

The business portion of the meeting was held on Saturday, March 18 and started promptly at 10 am. The moderator briefly went over the correct rules and the civil manner in which our town business is conducted, according to New Hampshire state laws. The meeting began with Article 3 since articles 1 & 2 were decided by ballot votes on Tuesday, March 14, 2017.

At this time Robert Lenox asked to be recognized by the moderator. He informed the audience that he was the originator of Articles 21 and 22 and was asking for support for those articles. He then made the following motion for Article 3: To see if the legislative body will vote to encourage the Selectmen to present a Town Warrant that is similar to the format used in the 2016 Town Warrant for the next Annual Town Meeting. It being understood that this is a **straw vote** and represents the will of the legislative body. The motion was moved and seconded as presented. David Upton went over the Select boards' reasons for combining all of the department budgets into one total amount. A discussion ensued, in which David Upton responded to most questions and comments. At one point

the moderator had to remind the audience to be respectful. After some time Michael French "called the question".

The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.

Article 03: To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$993,463 for general municipal operations of Town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning

Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has estimated anticipated offsetting funds in the amount of \$101.00 (plus accrued interest) to be expended toward principal payments for the Town Hall debt service, said funds to be transferred from the Town Hall Renovation Expendable Reserve account and the Library and/or Town Hall Expendable Reserve account created from private donations for that purpose. This article has anticipated additional offsetting revenue of \$227,770. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion made and seconded to accept Article 5 as read. David Upton spoke to this article, drawing attention to three areas: the maintenance for town buildings, energy conservation and the maintenance of our roads. Discussion followed.

Mike Blaudschun then made a motion to decrease the budget by \$125.000, which would bring it to \$868,463. Motion was seconded. Discussion followed about how adjustments would be made to the town's operating costs.

Motion **PASSED** by a voice vote.

A written ballot on the Amended Article was called for

Article as read **PASSED** by a voice vote

Article 04: Support of Town Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,268 for the support of the Town library, \$30,609 to be raised by taxes and \$7,659 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion made and seconded to accept ArtIcle 4 as read. Susan Peery spoke to this motion.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 05: Funding of various social service agencies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,061 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$1,000), Home Health Care Services (\$550), Meals on wheels (\$250), Monadnock Family Services (\$911), Southwestern Community Services (\$500), Monadnock Region

child Advocacy Center (\$1,000), and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2016, \$5,216 was paid in support of these social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$53,900 in food, services and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend these appropriations 3-0

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote

Article 06: Repair, clean and restore damaged headstones

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to repair, clean and restore damaged headstones in the Nelson and Munsonville cemeteries. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote

Article 07: Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$58,370.38. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote

Article 08: Drill a new Town well to supply water to Town Buildings

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of drilling a well on Town property and providing all necessary plumbing to supply water to the Nelson Town Hall, Library, and Town Office building. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Selectmen David Upton spoke to this article. A lengthy discussion followed on the methods of drilling for a well.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 09: Support of the 250th Celebration Committee

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 for the proper expenses of the 250th Celebration Committee appointed by the selectmen in 2015. Expenses may include all costs associated with planning, preparing and presenting the celebration including commissioning commemorative items for public purchase. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 10: Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$142,640.52. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 11: Add funds to Milfoil Prevention and Treatment Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$27,053.58. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 12: Funding for fighting forest fires with anticipated reimbursement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This sum to come as reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden and no amount will be raised through taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 13: Purchase of Forest Firefighting equipment

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purchase of Forest Firefighting equipment. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 14: Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$10,210.54. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article 15: Add funds to Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$127,396.92. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article 16: Fund special patrols or details performed by Nelson Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. The total sum to come from offsetting grants and/or revenues received for said patrols and details and no amount to be raised through taxation. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 17: Purchase and installation of 3 Dry Hydrants

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purchase and installation of 3 Dry Hydrants (2 new and 1 replacement). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 18: Add funds to Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The Selectmen are the agents to expend said funds.

The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2016 was approximately \$5,011.41. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 19: Purchase and Equip a Highway Truck

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000 for the purchase of a used M916A3 Freightliner Truck from Federal Surplus and to outfit said truck with a dump body, plow, sander and any other appropriate equipment, painting and signage so as to be used for highway maintenance. Further to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$95,000 from the Highway Equipment

Capital Reserve Fund previously set up for this purpose. The Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of December

31, 2016 was approximately \$127,396.92. This article is non-lapsing until December 31, 2018. The Road Agent and the Road Equipment Committee recommend this article. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 20: By Petition - Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,950 for the Game of Village Inc., a nonprofit 501 (c)3 organization, to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2017 - a summer learning experience. All children who live in Nelson and are entering 5th-8th grades may attend. This is a "Petitioned Article". The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article moved and seconded as read.

Article **PASSED** by a voice vote.

Article 21: By Petition - Create a Nelson Capital Equipment Committee

To see if the Town of Nelson located in Cheshire County in the State of New Hampshire will vote for the creation of a Nelson Capital Equipment committee for the purpose of working with the Fire and Rescue Department in the developing of a strategic plan, short and long term, for the purpose of identifying capital equipment purchases for the Town of Nelson. To work with the Nelson Fire and Rescue Department in the creation of any specifications required to acquire the needed equipment and to explore any grant opportunities that may be available for the acquisition of that equipment. To make recommendation to the Town body for the purchase of new capital equipment and to work with the Selectmen, the Fire and Rescue Department to write and apply for grants for that equipment. Capital equipment is identified as any single piece of equipment, building or trucks that cost more than five thousand dollars and would not normally appear in the Fire and Rescue department budget. It being understood this committee shall have a representative from the Selectmen's Office, members of either the Fire or Rescue Department, The Fire Chief and six members of the community as selected by the voters that would occupy staggered three year terms.

Article moved and seconded as read. David Upton stated that this article was flawed and should not be approved. Discussion followed. Ed Scott made an amendment to change the name of the petition to read "Create a Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee". To replace the words "Town body" in the middle of the petition to "Town Selectboard"

The amended article **passed** with a voice vote.

A written ballot was then called for

Article 22: By Petition - To appoint committee members if article #21 is approved

If the article to form a Nelson Capital Needs Equipment Committee is approved. To see if the Town of Nelson located in Cheshire County in the State of New Hampshire will vote to approve the following residents of the Nelson to the Nelson Capital Equipment Needs Committee: Robert W. Lenox 1 year, Philip Castelli 1 year, Barbara Roland 2 years, Robert West 2 years, Richard Lothrop 3 years, John Bunce 3 years.

Accepted as read and seconded.

This article also resulted in much discussion. An amendment was made to change the name of this committee to go along with Article 21 and to change all the terms of office to one year.

2017 Report of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library

Throughout 2017, the town of Nelson has been celebrating its 250th anniversary. Our first library was built in 1925 and now we have a collection of more than 8,000 items, and our work supports our community. While the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library is a steward of our history, we are equally on the forefront of what's new. The library reflects the ever-changing needs and wants of our patrons and has adapted services in ways to best serve the Nelson community.

While print materials are still the major component of most libraries, today's collections often mean that what you check out to read isn't limited to what's printed on paper but also includes what is available in digital form. EBooks and downloadable audiobook collections give you access to thousands of titles that can augment the traditional print ones the library has available, either on its shelves or through the State Library's Inter-Library Loan service.

The Nelson library is an information center, but it is a community center, too. No longer only used for quiet reading and research, it is filled with conversation about our latest interesting program, people drawing, folding origami, using computers and kids learning technology skills with Maker Play kits. The activities that take place at this public library are a direct reflection of this community's interests. So visit your public library often, become a part of what makes it great.

What the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library offers you:

- Our library is open 18 hours a week, and is free and open to the public.
- Nelson residents may borrow books, audio books on CD, magazines, a telescope, DVDs, kids games and puzzles, puppets, a felting kit.
- Online services include library computers, WiFi printers, a scanner and fax.
- More online services that can be accessed in the library or from home: downloadable eBooks, audio books, Kindle books, Ancestry.com, and EBSCO, a periodical data base.
- Special programs: author talks, summer forums, wildlife speakers, Nelson History Moment
- Monthly and weekly programs: Coffee hour every Saturday, handcraft group, book group, cookbook book group with a potluck, summer reading program with activities.
- Webpage: townofnelson.com with town events, updates on town groups, a town calendar, links to local groups and events.
- Humanities programs: This year gave us "Caesar" with Christopher Lockwood and "12000 Years Ago in the Granite State" with Robert Goodby.
- Origami, singing, movies, Zentangle, Brain Flakes, snap circuits, Lego, Stamps, Gears.

Events at the library, organized by the library: 136 events this year with 2,048 participants.

Books groups met 24 times with 210 people discussing.

Coffee Hour was held 48 times with 648 participants.

Knitters met 32 times with 116 pairs of knitting needles.

NH Humanities: 2 programs enjoyed by 83 in the audience.

Origami classes met 2 times with 10 participants. Storytelling had 36 in the audience.

Saturday morning speakers: 17 times with 424 participants.

Summer Forums were presented 4 times and had a total of 313 attendees.

Summer Reading Programs met 4 times and totaled 80 participants.

Zentangle:1 class with 4 artists. 6 movies with 38 viewers.

Use of the library by groups: There were 114 meetings by 18 groups. The library is thankful for the 221 hours that volunteers put in this year at the library. Elizabeth Williams: Ancestry Library Edition, Lisa Sieverts: Downloadable books on the Iphone.

Our monetary donors this year are the Library Friends group \$ 1,000.00 and a bench, Linda Singer: a bench and a bike rack in memory of Herb Singer, NH Charitable Trust, Henry Fuller Fund, Betsy Church and Mike French: funds for books, Anonymous \$ 2,000.00, John R. Bradshaw, Sally Coughlin, Marcia Sexton, KBA Grant, NH Humanities Council, Hardie Shepard Fund and the Henry Melville Fund. Many donations are made also of actual books, audio visual materials, and magazines. Al Stoops and Jan Perry donated subscriptions to magazines.

Children's Programs

The theme of the 2017 Summer Reading Program at the Nelson Library was Build a Better World. Four special programs were offered in July: Sara Shepherd did "Come Build a Better World" through reading, art and a scavenger hunt. Kathy Schillemat, one of Nelson's favorite naturalist's, presented appreciating the little things in nature, Richard Popovic did a good old-fashioned singalong, exploring folk songs that have made this world a better place and worked with the kids to write their own Nelson song. Lastly, Bill Dunn facilitated the building of birdhouses with salvaged materials. On Old Home Week we had our finale to summer reading. Simon Brooks, Storyteller regaled us with tales in the Nelson Town Hall. (Funding for the Kids, Books, and the Arts event is provided by the Jack and Dorothy Bryne Foundation, CHILIS, Cogswell Benevolent Trust, and is supported in part by a grant from the NH State Council on The Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts as well as funds administered by the NH State Library and provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.) We awarded Toadstool gift certificates (donated by the Friends of the Library) and ice cream certificates (donated by Twinkle Town) to readers. During this reading program 23 kids read 244 books.

Friends of the Library Annual Book Sale

The 2017 Old Home Day book sale proceeds were as follows: The total this year was \$1355. Member dues \$493, books \$837, auction of print \$25. The Book Sale and Friends memberships enable the Friends of the Olivia Rodham Library to donate \$1,000.00 for new books, pay for the summer reading certificates for the children. This year the Friends donated one of the new benches in front of the library. Books are donated all year so that there is always a good selection for sale. The Friends also encourage everyone to become members of the Friends knowing that the money goes back to benefit the library. The Friends group organizes a group of people to clean the library once a year. The officers of the Friends are as follows: President: Donna Kidd, Treasurer: Betsey Church. Other members volunteer for many library projects. There is an ongoing book sale in the lower level, below the library.

The Nelson Library Summer Forum for 2017

This year's summer forum talks, which are free and open to the public, and introduced by live music. Alan Rumrill, director of the Historical Society of Cheshire County, kicked off the celebration of Nelson's 250th anniversary with an illustrated talk about Nelson History. Lance Tucker of Boston College (and a Nelson summer resident) described the artistry and life of local painter, fiddler, and frame-maker Albert Quigley (1890-1960). Anthropologist Robert Goodby of Stoddard

discussed his archaeological research on the original inhabitants of the Monadnock Region in his talk, "12,000 Years Ago in the Granite State." This was a NH Humanities program. Beekeeper Rick Church revealed amazing and fascinating facts about bees, and the challenges and sweet rewards of beekeeping. Max Nunnemaker and Gordon Peery played "Flight of the Bumblebee" as an introduction.

Friday, March 24, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm, by Moderator Lewis Derby. Nine students from Nelson School sang a patriotic song and led those assembled in the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Derby introduced administrators from Nelson School and SAU 29 as well as professionals involved in the design and plans for the Nelson school addition and asked the voters if they gave permission for those administrators and professionals to speak if necessary. The voters agreed.

ARTICLE 1:To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of constructing an addition to the Nelson Elementary School, and related expenditures to complete the project, and further to authorize the issuance of not more than \$1,000,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the school board to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes, and also to determine the rate of interest thereon; or to take any other action in relation thereto. And further to raise and appropriate the first year's interest payment in the amount of up to \$14,700. (The Nelson School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article.) (2/3 ballot vote required).

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. After considerable discussion, the vote was called. The polls opened at 7:55 pm. Secret Written Ballots were placed in a separate ballot box for the purpose of the bond issue vote. After one hour, Moderator Derby declared the polls closed at 8:55 pm. The result of the written ballot was Yes: 73, No: 16, of those present and voting at the School District Meeting.

ARTICLE 2:To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved and seconded that Article 2 be accepted as read. The article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3:To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,814,594 for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. After some discussion, the article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4:To see if the District will vote to approve and confirm a long-term, 12-year tuition contract between the District and the Sullivan School District, which provides for the long-term education of Sullivan elementary students on a per student split cost basis between the two districts (established in 2013), and further, which contains provisions for the early withdrawal of either District and other provisions. A 2/3 vote is required. (The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. After some discussion, the vote was called. A secret written ballot was taken. The result of the written ballot was Yes: 76, No: 3, of those present and voting.

During the time that the written ballots were being counted, Kelly French, School Board Chair, and Richard Popovic, School Board member, asked for those assembled for a show of appreciation for Sara Marean for her service on the school board. Kathy Schillemat, School District Clerk, also asked for a show of appreciation to Richard Church who had served for many years as School District and Town Moderator. Those assembled gave a round of applause for both.

ARTICLE 5:To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$25,000 from its unassigned fund balance, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2017, to the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/ reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)

It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as presented. After some discussion, the article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6:To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$5,000 from its unassigned fund balance, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2017, to the Special Education/Middle and High School Tuition Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999, for the purpose of paying future year unanticipated special education/ and or middle and high school tuitions, or to take any other action in relation thereto. If there is an insufficient, undesignated fund balance as of June 30, 2017 to fund this appropriation and the appropriation in Article 5, then Article 5 will be funded first, with any additional surplus to be applied to this warrant article. (The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)

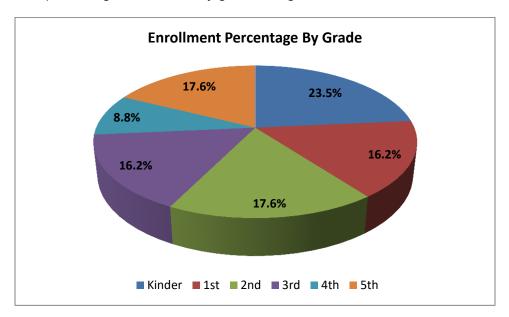

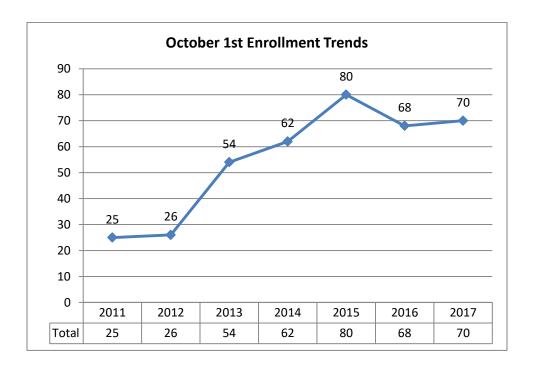
Our student enrollment is as follows as of 1/5/18: Kindergarten; 14 students (8 - Nelson, 6-Sullivan), Grade 1; 14 students (8-Nelson, 6-Sullivan), Grade 2; 9 students (4-Nelson, 5-Sullivan), Grade 3; 14 students (7-Nelson, 7-Sullivan), Grade 4; 12 students (5-Nelson, 7-Sullivan), and Grade 5; 5 students (3-Nelson, 2-Sullivan).

Total enrollment is 68 students (35 - Nelson, 33- Sullivan).

Facility / Maintenance

Our new addition is nearing completion. We are thankful for the support of the community in recognizing our need for more space as our enrollment numbers continue to increase. Our MPR (multi-purpose room) will increase by 50%. Two large classrooms are being added, one for an additional classroom and the other for our "Specials" classes which includes Art and Music. The remaining area is comprised of a couple of storage rooms, a custodial closet, a restroom, and a conference room. The elevation of the addition has caused some challenges that have been addressed by installing a retaining wall on the playground side of the addition. We also needed to be mindful of ADA requirements regarding railings and ramps. Ingram Construction is the Construction Manager for this project and has worked well with our district staff during the construction.

Community Support / Service

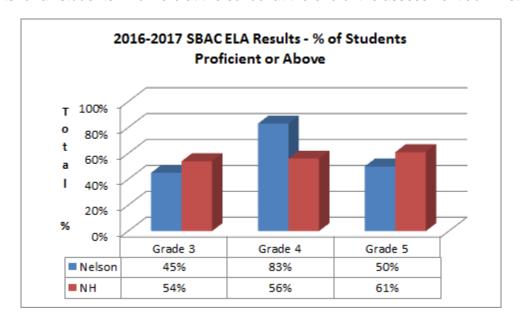
Our community continues to provide exceptional support in a variety of ways. We have 5 community members who help out weekly with our STEM Club. Members of the town's Trail and Agriculture Committees volunteer their time to work with our students and provide instruction. Our Parent Teacher Organization continues to support our students in a variety of ways. Parents help volunteer for various activities in both the classroom and entire school. The Keene Lions Club has provided vision testing for our K-1 students and also provided financial support in obtaining eyewear for some of our students. The Cheshire Smiles organization has provided dental care as well as fluoride treatments to a number of our students already this school year. The Keene Rotary Club supplies all of our 2nd grade students with new sneakers as well as provides dictionaries to our 3rd graders. The Harris Center continues to provide unique learning opportunities to our students by bringing artifacts into our classrooms each week. This list is certainly not the only support our school has been the recipient of this year. The staff and students are extremely thankful for the continued support of our parents, community members, and friends.

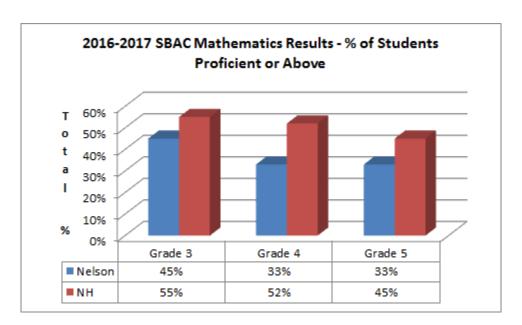
New Faculty / Staff

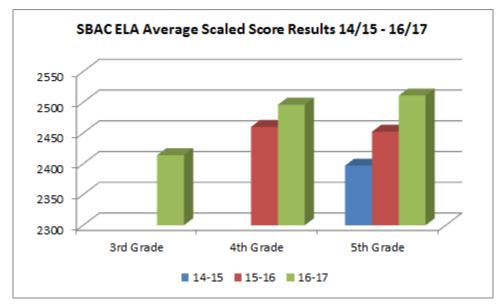
SMARTER BALANCED ASSESSMENT RESULTS

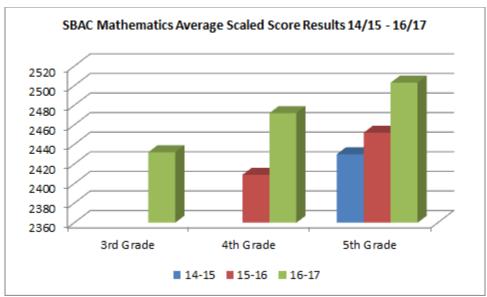
Results for all students who were at the school at the end of the assessment administration



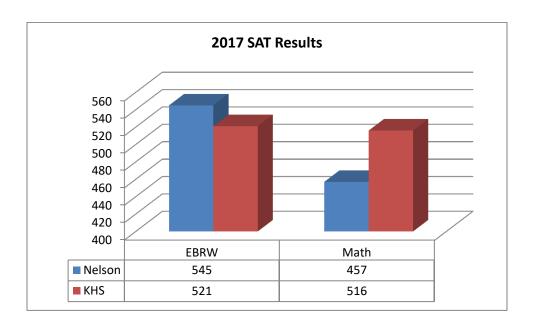

Specials

In addition to our regular classroom curriculum, we offer daily specials to all of our students. A unique educational experience is provided once again this year through the Harris Center. This collaboration allows a Naturalist to work with our students for an hour each week. Spanish, Art, Physical Education, and Music also meet one day each week for an hour block of time in each of our classes. Those teachers collaborate with our classroom teachers to ensure smooth transitions and themes or content that is appropriate to what is happening in their classrooms whenever possible.

Co-Curricular

Our STEM club meets weekly and is open to all students. We began the STEM club in October and it will run until the last week of May. Students are using LEGO kits to learn about coding and principles of science, engineering, and mathematics. We have over 50% of our students participating in this program. This club would not be possible without the community volunteers who assist the children and the funding made available through grants. Our afterschool program continues to provide a safe and structured place for many of our students until 5:30 pm daily. Students are able to work on completing their school work, play games, have snacks, and participate in various activities. We are proud to be able to offer this self-sustaining program to our parents. We are fortunate again this year to offer musical instruction to our students each week. Mr. Chris Albertson provides instrumental lessons while Ms. Louisa Engle instructs our strings program. We have many other clubs that are offered throughout the school year to our students by our staff. These clubs are 6 to 8 weeks in length. The following are clubs offered this year: Math, Dance, Tennis, Yearbook, Craft, Rocket, and Yoga.

Technology

Nelson Elementary School continues to stay current on the latest technology. Professional Development opportunities have been provided to all staff members and grants have been used to fund various improvements in our school. We purchased and installed 65" Promethean touch panels in each classroom to begin the school year. Teachers are feeling comfortable using this technology to enrich and support the teaching in their classrooms. Our wireless internet is in the process of being upgraded to provide added bandwidth necessary when whole classes are logged onto the computers simultaneously (which is the case when we are administering state tests). We are installing a POE (power over Ethernet) switch to our computer server which will eliminate the need for our routers to be plugged into electrical outlets. Additional Chromebooks have been added to our inventory to account for the increased enrollment. A staff member is currently being trained to meet the state mandate of having a certified Library Media Specialist who will focus on assisting our staff with technology needs. This stipend position will begin next school year.

Competency-Based Grading

Our faculty has been working on developing a new standards based report card which we have implemented this school year in all of our classes and grades. Using competency based grading is a change from traditional grading but it is supported by research. We have worked with families to help them understand how this process works and what being "competent" in a particular standard means by using rubrics. During parent / teacher conferences any questions or concerns have been addressed and we are pleased with our transition to this way of grading. We are working with other schools in the SAU to continue to improve and refine our Standards Based Report Cards.

School Start Time Committee

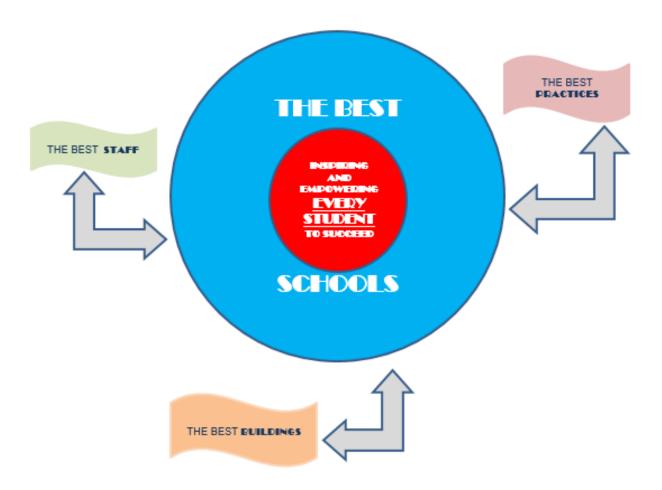
At a regular meeting of the Keene Board of Education on February 14, 2017, the Keene Board directed the administration to develop a research plan for shifting the start times of the Keene schools for the 2019-2020 school year. The committee (consisting of 20 members including representatives of each of the town districts to be impacted) met for the first time on August 3, 2017 to begin the process. A public forum was held on November 29, 2017 in order to gather feedback from stakeholders regarding the potential shift in school start times beginning with the 2019-2020 school year. Following the forum, a stakeholder survey was distributed to further gather feedback. The committee meets the first Wednesday of the month at the Central Office. A final proposal to the Keene Board of Education will be provided at the June 2018 KBE meeting.

School Calendar Committee

The 20-member committee began meeting on September 20, 2017 to begin the process of developing the 2018-2019 school year calendar. The committee distributed a stakeholder survey at the end of September seeking input regarding the creation of the 2018-2019 calendar. The results of the survey can be found at www.sau29.org.

Strategic Plan Update

The existing strategic plan (through school year 2014-2015) has been evaluated and current practices analyzed resulting in the new model for the SAU 29 Strategic Plan. The focal point of the Plan is the vision for SAU 29, "To inspire and empower every student to succeed". Superintendent Malay presented the updated version of the Strategic Plan to the NHSAU29 School Board on September 27, 2017. The key points of the plan involve having the **best staff**, the **best buildings**, and the **best practices** to ensure that SAU 29 is comprised of the best schools in the state.



In the fall of 2017, Superintendent Malay shared the turnover (30%) in staffing at the Central Office with the NHSAU29 School Board and plans to stabilize and elevate the quality of staffing going forward. Recent hires have led to greater confidence that the Central Office is operating at an optimum level with a high quality staff in place for the foreseeable future. In the Superintendent's Office, the addition of Assistant Superintendent Dotty Frazier has resulted in positive changes and forward-thinking momentum that has already resulted in the strengthening of our services to schools. Shayna Pelkey (Administrative Assistant) and Antje Hornbeck (Public Information Coordinator) round out the new hires in the Superintendent's Office. Dr. Rick Matte, Director of Student Services has hit the ground running and brings his expertise to the former Special Education Department, now further broadened to cover a greater area of services for all students. Ryanne Schoonover, Administrative Assistant joined the Student Services Department at the start of the 2017-2018 school year. Veteran technician Bob Milliken has taken on the role of Information Technology Manager bringing stability and expertise to his role with the IT Department. In the Business Office, Jaime Donovan (Administrative Assistant) has filled the final opening in the staff and has proven to be a welcomed addition to the Central Office.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT 2017

Another year of meetings and administrative services; special projects, budgets, ordinances, assessments, and audits has passed.

As is true each year, the kinds of work that your Select Board does can be described in three general categories:

I. Preserve the Commons:

Preserve Air, Water, Land, Open Space, and Environmental Quality

II. Maintain Civil Order:

Develop and Enforce Rules and Regulations that Restrict Inconsiderate and Irresponsible Behavior

III. Provide Public Services:

Provide Administrative Services, Roads, Welfare, Fire and Police Protection

As we did for 2016, we'll organize this report of our work in 2017 using these three categories.

I. Preserving the Commons

1. Reducing Municipal Carbon Emissions

In 2016, the Select Board adopted goals for reducing carbon dioxide emissions from the burning of fossil fuels in town buildings and town vehicles. These goals were developed in cooperation with the Nelson Sustainability Group and are shown below.

Goals for Reducing Municipal Fossil Fuel Consumption

- 1. Strive to reduce purchased non-renewable energy consumption in municipal buildings by 75% by the year 2025.
- 2. Strive to reduce consumption of fossil fuels by town vehicles by 50% by the year 2025. Plans for Achieving the Established Goals
- 1. Account for all energy presently purchased for municipal use, both buildings and vehicles.
- 2. Conduct professional energy audits of all town buildings.
- 3. Develop an inventory of sources of renewable energy available to the town; solar, wind, hydro.
- 4. Propose plans for making town buildings more energy efficient.
- 5. Propose plans for reducing use of diesel/gasoline by town vehicles.
- 6. Propose plans for using, preferably locally produced, renewable energy for lighting and heating town buildings.

As reported in 2016, we began with the successful installation of a solar photovoltaic system on the roof of our library. In 2017, we completed an energy conservation project for the Town Barn/Safety Building, the Library/Connector Building, and the Brick Schoolhouse. (We've been told that the Town Barn is now comfortably warm and the furnaces no longer need to run continuously.) Our Buildings Committee is presently working on the development of plan for a grid-tied solar array that will provide enough energy to light and heat all municipal buildings. We hope to be able to bring this project for Town approval at our Town Meeting in 2019.

2. Osgood/Hurd Hill Conservation

We have continued to support the work of our Nelson Conservation Commission as they developed the plans, and provided the funding, for the town to purchase, and place in conservation easement, nearly 600 acres of land known as the Osgood/Hurd Hill property. The actual transfer of ownership of the property, to the Town of Nelson from the Harris Center for Conservation Education, took place in June after we successfully concluded negotiations with the Harris Center that established the terms of the conservation easement that are consistent with the interests of the Town.

II. Maintain Civil Order

The Planning Board drafted and presented, and you supported, changes to our Zoning Ordinances that will help guide your Select Board in the approval of building permits for Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU's). Admittedly, the new NH State Statute allowing ADU's is complicated, but the changes that we have made in our Zoning Ordinance should help guide its proper administration.

III. Provide Public Services

Accomplishments in both Administrative Services, and Public Works projects are worth noting.

1. Administrative Services

Assessment Audit

First, we'd like to share, with you, a commendation received by our Administration for the quality of the town-wide property reassessment that our Administrative Office conducted in 2016. An excerpt from this report from the NH DRA is as follows:

We are pleased to report that you have met all of the above standards as recommended by the Assessing Standards Board (ASB). Your attention to detail, thoroughness, periodic review, integrity and hard work are commendable. You stand out as an excellent example for other communities to follow.

Congratulations and thank you for a job well done!"

Tax Rate Reduction

We are pleased to report that we were able to authorize the use of \$100,000 from Fund Balance to reduce your property taxes for 2017. Hopefully, we will be able to take a similar action in 2018.

2. Public Works Projects

Fire Code Compliance

Thanks to the design and negotiating skills of our Fire Code Compliance Consultant, the NH Fire Marshal's Office agreed to a fire code compliance project for our Town Barn/Safety Building having a reduced scope of work from that previously specified. The new design included the installation of fire walls and fire doors for only the Highway Department Maintenance Bay, rather than the original requirement for enclosing the Police Sally Port, the Fire and Rescue Department garage and the Highway Department garage. The new plan also included the installation of a comprehensive alarm system and interior and exterior emergency lighting. All of this work has been completed.

Also, the Fire Marshal's Office agreed that we did not have to build a remotely located fuel storage shed with a remote fuel dispensing station. (We had received quotes of \$35k and up for such a structure.) The design option that was approved, and that we chose, simply required that our diesel fuel storage tanks be moved to a location at least 5 feet from the wall of the Town Barn. Mike Tarr and Nick Barrett enlarged our existing fuel storage shed using a design developed by Gary Robinson. Our thanks to Mike, Nick, and Gary for service above and beyond the call.

New Highway Truck

As you may recall, you approved funds for the purchase and outfitting of a U. S. Government surplus heavy duty truck for use by our Highway Department. Mike Tarr and our Road Equipment Committee achieved success on all counts in this regard. We bought an all-wheel drive, 10-wheel, heavy duty truck for \$3,500. The truck had 3,000 miles on it at the time. Mike completed the outfitting of this truck before snowfall, while staying within the approved \$95,000 budget.

New Well

Another project that was approved for 2017 was the drilling of a new well to serve the Library, Town Hall, and Brick Schoolhouse. Cushing and Sons Company drilled the well for us to a depth of over 500 ft. This well produces 8 gallons of water per minute and has a static level of approximately 20 feet below ground level. This is more water than the buildings that are served could possibly use.

Water clarity from this new well is much improved from that of the old well. Nonetheless, trace amounts of manganese are present, but the minerals present do not constitute a health hazard. However, from the beginning of our water quality testing, we found the presence of coloform bacteria that make the water unsafe to drink. We have tested and chlorinated and retested and re-chlorinated and, at last, our most

recent test showed that the bacteria were not present. We will do at least two more water quality tests before we have enough confidence to allow folks to drink this water.

Excerpts from 250th Proclamations

Since the theme of our 2017 Town Report is the Town's 250th Centennial Celebration, we'd like to reference, here, comments made by NH State Senator Jay Kahn and United States Senator Jeanne Shaheen at the ceremony held on July 8, 2017.

"Nelson is revered for its beautiful hills, forests and fields, clear lakes, artistic culture and rural life. The community's enduring pride conveyed in its town center demonstrates its values of education, social connection and environmental stewardship".

From U. S. Senator Jeanne Shaheen

"Nelson has experienced significant change since 1751 when it was chartered as Monadnock Number Six, but the town has always maintained its quintessential beauty and welcoming small town charm. Nelson exemplifies how a small community should be run. Dedicated public servants ably manage local affairs while supporting numerous communal cultural events, organized by groups of dedicated volunteers, including weekly conta dances sponsored by the Monadnock Folklore Society. Over the years, Nelson's industries have evolved from growing crops and raising livestock to light manufacturing of wood products and textiles to a variety of craftsmen and small businesses. Its blending of the past and present as well as its embrace of local culture make Nelson a wonderful place to live and a wonderful place to visit."

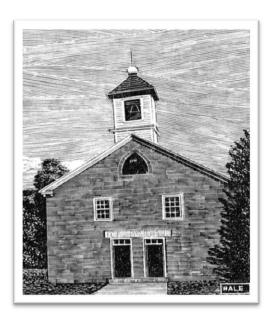
We're very excited to report that the new tax maps were finalized in 2017. The new maps follow one consistent scale and each map shows property lines from abutting maps. Changes also include the use of the original property identification numbers. TOWN BUILDINGS COMMITTEE REPORT 2017

The two main projects for the Nelson Town Buildings Committee this year were remediation of Town Buildings for **Fire Code Compliance** and **Energy Conservation**. In several areas, through working with contractors, we were able to satisfy both the goal of Fire Code Compliance and the goal of Energy Conservation with the same building construction activity. The end result is that Town Buildings are safer for staff and residents, and we should see reduced energy costs in the future. For Fire Code Compliance, the work included installation of fire walls and doors, installing a comprehensive alarm system and both interior and exterior emergency lighting. The Energy Conservation contractor, when he began the work in mid-December, observed that the furnaces in the Town Barn/Safety Building ran nearly continuously. Both he and Mike Tarr have observed that this is no longer the case. Mike Tarr says now that the work is done, the Town Barn is warm when he comes in in the morning and the furnaces aren't running all the time.

The third project that the Buildings Committee worked on was the replacement of the well that serves the Town Hall and the Library. The old well had become unreliable and in addition, due to decisions made in the distant past, the well was not located on Town property. A warrant article passed in 2017 provided funding for a new well. By July, the new well was dug on Town property behind the Town Hall, down to 560 feet and was servicing the buildings. However, testing of the water from the new well consistently showed unsafe levels of bacteria. To date, the well has been shocked with chlorine several times, and all dead-end piping has been removed. Our latest water quality test (completed in early January) showed no bacteria, but we are planning a couple more tests over the next several months to improve our confidence that we have solved the problem.

We thank the contractors for the excellent work done this year — we have a commitment to hiring local companies whenever possible.

- Newell and Crathern for the energy conservation work.
- Ted Stiles helped us develop the specs for our energy conservation RFP.
- Jerry Tepe, our Fire Code Compliance Consultant, negotiated with the state Fire Marshal's Office to design a functional and cost effective solution to correct the fire code violations found in our Town Barn/Safety Building.
- Bergeron Construction did the fire doors and fire walls at the Town Barn/Safety Building.
- BK Systems installed the new alarm system for those buildings.
- Hamblett Electric did the emergency lighting for both the Town Barn/Safety Building and the Granite Lake Fire Station.
- Cushing and Sons Well Company drilled the well for us.
- Tolman Builders installed the required personnel door at the Granite Lake Station.

Longer term, the Nelson Town Buildings Committee continues to research ways to reduce the town's consumption of fossil fuels. Ideas under consideration include building hydrogen fuel cells and/or a larger solar installation on town property with the goal of providing renewable energy for all Town buildings.

The Solar panels on the Library, installed and up and running as of July 26, 2016, produced 10,400 kWh in 2017, about \$2,578 of electricity. This is almost the equivalent to the annual consumption of two average homes.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Report 2017

In 2017 my office dealt with many interesting and challenging situations, I have acquired additional knowledge and experience as a result. As your Town Clerk and Tax Collector I strive to do my best to meet your needs and to have my office provide excellent service at all times.

We fortunately only had one election this year as compared to 2016 when we had four. Our Town meeting is now divided into 2 days: the 2nd Tuesday in March was the election of town officials and on the following Saturday was the actual meeting. It all went very smoothly. Nine open positions were voted on. As a result of a resident's request we conducted a recount for the open selectmen's position. The school District had 4 open positions to fill. In total, 142 ballots with 7 absentee ballots were cast. We also had one Article to be voted on during the Town Election to amend zoning ordinances. This election as most of our elections could not have happened so efficiently without the assistance of many people. I'd like to thank Wayne Fulton, our able custodian who converts the Town Hall into a Polling Station. I couldn't do this without a group of election workers who always contribute greatly to the running of an election. If anyone is interest in joining this fun group just let me know.

The Nelson Town Clerk's office registered 1,076 vehicles and 31 boats, licensed 222 dogs, recorded 2 marriages, 11 births, and 7 deaths. We also sold one cemetery lot. We researched and issued certified copies of vital records and notarized documents as needed. These transactions, along with miscellaneous items, resulted in revenue to the town of \$123,631.

The New Hampshire law states that all dogs must be registered by April 30th of each year. Last year we sent out early reminder post cards to all dog owners, we found this that helped somewhat in getting your dogs registered in a timely manner. Dogs can be registered either by coming into the office or by mail. The dog application for a license is on our town web site.

The property tax rate for 2017 was 18.65 per thousand dollars of assessed value. The amount of liens executed this year was an increase from the previous year, but a decrease from 2015.

2017 2016 2015 Liens executed: \$69,621 \$61,876 \$98,558

To keep abreast of new laws and changes in procedures and duties, Karen and I attend various workshops and trainings. For the first time this year, I attended a workshop at the Historical Society of Cheshire County titles: "The Best Laid Plans". This interesting workshop covered the correct procedures and methods of keeping our records, especially our valuable historical documents intact and preserved. I also, attend the annual conferences sponsored by the Town Clerk Association and the Tax Collector Association.

I'd like to express my gratitude to the residents of Nelson for their support and courtesy shown to this office. We look forward to seeing you in 2018.

2017 REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The Town's continued participation in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool (NH-PDIP) provided stable investment returns during 2017.

The NH-PDIP combines trust funds from all member Towns state wide into a conservatively-invested portfolio which provides the security required by state law. Interest earnings on the Town's trust funds invested at NH-PDIP totaled \$6,559.16 in 2017.

Voters approved a total of \$90,000 in new contributions to existing trust funds in 2017. In addition, the Town received a matching grant of \$145,000 from the New Hampshire Land and Water Conservation Fund as partial reimbursement for the 580 acres of land purchased from the Harris Center. That purchase was paid entirely from private funds donated years ago to the Nelson Conservation Commission by the estate of Sidney Partridge. The matching grant funds have been deposited into the Conservation Commission Expendable Trust Fund created by voters in 2016, and will be used to support the acquisition, care, maintenance, protection, improvement, and/or public use of conservation and recreational land in the Town of Nelson.

Two trust funds created by voters in 2015 for the purpose of Town Hall and Library renovations were closed in 2017, after those projects were completed and final fund balances were expended.

The Trustees would like to remind potential donors about the provision in the Trust Fund Investment Policy which authorizes private donations in the form of securities to fund special Town purposes. This option provides flexibility and potential tax advantages to individuals wishing to sponsor or support worthy Town projects.

Any residents who would like further information on Nelson's Trust Funds or investment policy are invited to contact one of the Trustees, or to attend one of our posted public meetings.

2017 REPORT OF THE NELSON CEMETERY BOARD

The year 2017 was one of transitions for the Nelson Cemetery Board. At one point in the year we were at full membership, with Harry Flanagan, Marty French, Candyce Fulford, Elaine Giacomo and Sarah Wilson working hard to maintain and enhance our beautiful, historic cemeteries. Unfortunately, Candyce was forced to resign due to ill health, but will continue working on the cemetery database that she developed for the town. Sarah Wilson is now attending graduate school in addition to her full-time job, but is staying on until we can find a replacement. Please contact Elaine Giacomo if you have any interest in serving on the committee.

Michael Shawver was once again hired to perform maintenance for both cemeteries, and he has done a marvelous job – we have received many compliments on his work. On Memorial Day, the Nelson Cemetery was in fine shape for the annual Memorial Day service. Following the service, members of the Nelson Band and Cub Scouts from Pack 530 remained behind to plant geraniums that were generously donated by Diana Lee, who grows flowers for the Home Depot.

Also in the spring, committee members set to work cleaning headstones at the Nelson Cemetery using K2, a pH neutral cleaner recommended by Peterborough Marble and Granite. The results were excellent, and we plan to do more in the spring. Any help is welcomed.

Throughout the year the committee kept a list of jobs that need to be done to maintain the integrity and appearance of the cemeteries. These include, but are not limited to the following:

- Replace sign at Munsonville cemetery
- Remove dead limbs and trim trees in both cemeteries
- Address the erosion problem in the "new" Nelson cemetery
- Place gravel on roadway in "new" Nelson cemetery
- Address erosion problem on roadway in Munsonville cemetery

Peterborough Marble and Granite continued repairing and restoring headstones in the "old" Nelson cemetery. Due to other work commitments, they were unable to do the bulk of the work until September and October of last year. We hope to continue the restoration, but are with a smaller budget than we requested last year.

A reminder to all those who have loved ones interred in the Nelson and Munsonville cemeteries – please remove all plants, decorations and statuary from the graves before Veterans Day. We cannot be responsible for the safety of these objects, and it makes for much more cleanup work in the spring. The Nelson Cemetery Board meets monthly on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Nelson Library conference room. Visitors are welcome. 2017 REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

2017 was a productive year for the Nelson Conservation Commission. At the end of June, after three years' worth of steady industry and with the generous bequest of Sid and Claire Partridge and grants from the Land and Water Conservation Fund and the Quabbin to Cardigan Partnership, the Town of Nelson acquired 580 acres of land from the Harris Center for Conservation Education. The Harris Center has retained the conservation easement on the land, and we will work with them over the coming year to develop a Stewardship Plan for the property.

Just before the end of the year, the Conservation Commission sent out requests for proposals for a forestry management plan for the land. Early in February, we will begin the process of hiring a forester to manage the property, with the oversight of the Conservation Commission, into the future. Input from the community is welcome as we consider recreational uses and trails for the town land. In addition, we will be holding a contest to name the land. Look for more information soon.

The Conservation Commission also sponsored two clean up days in the spring, co-sponsored with the Agricultural Commission a Pollinators talk with Francie Von Martens in June, and had a workday to remove 3000 feet of galvanized and plastic pipe from the town land in October.

The Conservation Commission meets monthly. Starting in March, the commission will meet on the first Thursday of the month, at 7:00 pm, in the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library. The public is always welcome.

With the company that was hired in 2016 to process raw materials from the Gilsum gravel Pit, we had enough gravel and stone to supply The Town for two years. Over the course of the summer, the Highway Department was able to easily haul and stockpile these materials in our usual manner. Also over the summer months, with The Town having roads in need of repair, we were able to pave the north side of Murdough Hill Road along with patching several other roads.

At the 2017 Town Meeting the voters agreed to purchase a used military truck to replace the 2004 International six wheel dump truck. After a few months of working with our Federal Surplus Representative, we were granted a truck through the screening process, receiving a 2009 Freightliner M916A3 ten wheel heavy duty truck. This truck has been outfitted with a dump body and the necessary equipment for plowing and sanding.

The Highway Department does appreciate updates on road conditions in your area. The Road Crew will respond to any problems in a timely manner using the tools and materials made available to us.

The trailer simulates smoke and fire in a dwelling and the students are instructed by Rescue Personnel and Fire Fighters on how to evacuate the dwelling correctly and safely. Every student had a chance to go through the trailer, practice what they learned and get to know the EMT's and Fire Fighters. The EMD staff was present on Old Home Day to help man the Rescue Vehicle which was on display and open for inspection. It was a popular stop for parents as well as children who enjoyed operating the lights and siren.

The Emergency Management Department is one of the sponsors of the town Halloween Party. It is always fun to watch parents and children dress up and have fun in the spirit of the season.

This year the town's ability to respond to an emergency was put to the test by a microburst that occurred on the night of August 22nd. The Fire Department received its first call around 10pm and from then until 8pm on the 23rd the Fire Department, Road Agents, Police Department and Emergency Management Department where continuously on scene until power was restored and the roads were open. Their teamwork and cooperation with the Electric Company were instrumental in restoring power and opening the roads as quickly as they did. The Town is rightfully proud of our First Responders.

We look forward to continuing our progress on training our staff as well as educating our neighbors on the importance of safety and Emergency Management. We will continue to work hand in hand with our First Responders. They are an outstanding group of people and are a pleasure to work with.

This year we have endured several calls as you can see below. One of them stands out to me and reassures me how great this community is in a time of need. This would be the call in the Tolman pond/ Lake Nubanusit area. For this call we had to call in our emergency management director our Police department and as many members of the Nelson fire and rescue as we could muster up. This event which we have now been lead to believe was a micro burst that devastated this area for multiple days with clean up still going on I believe. I would like to extend thanks to all involved and again remind people that we were doing our very best to ensure you folks were safe at all cost and that the crews could do their work as safely as possible. Friendly reminder please stays in your houses and away from all of the trees and wires down until we deem it safe. We truly do not want to see anyone getting hurt. Rest assure we will be checking each and every house to assure your safety and well-being. Again thank you!!

This year we have once again tried to get the dry hydrants in place. We got to work with our engineer to start the permit process. Met with a great team in Concord to ensure we were going after the proper information to obtain the proper permits and then off to find the proper locations. This is where we ran into a little snafu with having the proper volume of water at the projected sites. The long and short is we are still working on this and as of right now should have a permit for one hydrant replacement and are working diligently on the other two locations.

The tanker as I have said in years past is in need of replacement. We have been working diligently with the committee to get a grant application in and will let them fill you in on this.

I am proud to say we have two members who have taken their positions as Nelson Fire fighters to the next level. These two members have dedicated roughly 250 hours of nights and weekends to take the Firefighter I class this past fall. We currently have one that has completed this class and is Firefighter I certified and another that is almost there. Please congratulate Reilly Pratt & Jackie Ward for all their hard work here.

We had two members up for recertification this year for their EMR license. This requires continuing education credits to re-certify. Which are again hours away from your families? Please thank your EMTs and EMRs when you see them.

I wish to ask all of you to join me in thanking the Fire and Rescue members of this great town for their continued hard work and dedication. To put aside their lives and be there to help all of you at a moment's notice. Thank you I say. Below you will see some of our accomplishments over the past year:

- We have added one additional Firefighter I certified member this year bringing us to 9 Members that are state certified at the Firefighter I level.
- Most members have completed Defensive Driving training for trucks.

- We have 5 licensed EMTs. We regret to say we lost one of our EMRs this year dropping us to 1 licensed First Responder; this is still remarkable for a small town.
- All trucks have passed there NH state safety inspected, with minor issues this year.
- For 5 years we have hosted monthly EMS training for Nelson, Harrisville and Sullivan conducted by a variety of outside professionals.
- Participated in Nelson Memorial Day Parade and the Stoddard Parade.
- We also participated in a fire awareness parade in Keene in which we won 1st place in best appearing Rescue
- Fire Department co-hosted the town Halloween Party
- Fire department put on the food for our 250th celebration
- Fire Awareness at Nelson School with the Mutual Aid Fire Trainer Trailer.
- Nelson School is compliant with State Fire and Safety inspection requirements.
- Nelson Town Buildings are in process of becoming compliant with State Fire and Safety inspection requirements.

Remember to call 911 immediately with any emergency. This gets the alarm out and gets us on the way.

Our department has been steadily growing with both knowledge /personnel and still can always use an extra hand. If you or you know of anybody interested in becoming a member of a great organization and are willing to help out at any given moment. Please seek out one of our member for the application as we would love to have you. New members bring new energy and strengthen our team. Please contact any member for details.

Prevent Forest Fires



It is unlawful to...

- Burn brush or other materials when the ground is not covered by snow without a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
- Burn in an outdoor fireplace without a fire permit.
- Kindle certain categories of fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except when raining. When raining, a fire permit is still required. Please check with your local Forest Fire Warden to determine allowable burning times.
- Kindle a fire for any purpose on land of another without written
 permission of the owner or owner's agent and a written permit from the
 Forest Fire Warden of the town, except in authorized recreational areas
 where suitable fireplaces are approved by the Forest Fire Warden.
- Fail to totally extinguish any fire before leaving it.
- Discard matches, cigarettes or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.
- Throw any flammable waste material on, near, or adjacent to a public highway or private way in or near woodlands.
- Fail to report a forest or brush fire or fail to respond to a Forest Fire Warden's call for assistance.

Violations of the law (RSA 227-L) are subject to the following penalties:

Violation - May be fined up to \$1,000

Misdemeanor - May be fined up to \$2,000 or imprisoned up to one year or both.

A Quick Guide To Open Burning

All burning must be conducted in accordance with state laws, state rules, local ordinances and under a "Permit To Kindle Fire" issued by the local Fire Warden or authorized agent.

Materials Not Acceptable for Burning:

- Construction & demolition debris
- Tires
- Household trash
- Packaging materials
- Plastics
- Coated or laminated paper
- Coated or treated cardboard
- Oily rags
- Animal, vegetable and kitchen waste
- Used Oil, gasoline and hazardous waste
- · Brush greater than 5 inches in diameter
- Any wood that has been painted/stained, glued, or treated in any way

Materials Acceptable for Burning:

- Campfire wood
- Charcoal
- Clean pallets

If generated on-site

- Brush (less than 5 inches in diameter)
- Clean lumber scraps (private single family residences only)

Granite Lake Village District State of New Hampshire Annual Meeting April 15, 2017

John Halter called the meeting to order at 3 minutes after 9 a.m. on Sat. April 15, 2017.

Phil Hamilton introduced the new commissioner from last year, Harold Roeder aka Butch. Also for his benefit Phil gave a quick history of the dam and the need for a Granite Lake Village District. In addition Phil mentioned that he would like to research a new gate arrangement to facilitate raising and lowering the water level. The board agreed to have him look into it.

John proceeded to read the warrant articles for voting.

Article 1. election of officers

To choose one commissioner for a term of three years, and to see who the inhabitants of the District will elect for the the offices of auditor, treasurer, moderator, and clerk, each for one year. Nominations for commissioner for 3 years, Bob Woods; for auditor, John Halter; treasurer, Barbara Ropiecki; moderator, John Halter; clerk, Sally Ripley.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded. The vote was affirmative.

Article 2. Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Village District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the *Capital Reserve Fund for dam maintenance/repair/replacement established in December 2008.*Commissioners recommended.

Phil described how in a few years or sooner we will need to reface the dam, including taking the existing face back to the footings. May cost \$50,000. and up.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded. majority vote was affirmative.

Article 3. General operating expenses

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for Village District expenses. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded. majority vote was affirmative.

Article 4. Insurance

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$830.00 to pay for liability insurance for the District. Barbara, treasurer, commented that the amount had gone up only \$30.00 from last year under the newly assigned agent, Primex.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded. majority vote was affirmative.

Article 5. Repair fence

To see if the District will vote to appropriate \$1000.00 to repair the existing fence around the dam area with said funds to come from unassigned fund balance.

John Cucchi spoke up about his plan to build on his property below the dam, saying that he would get the State dam engineer to come down and discuss high/low risk factors.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded to vote on the fence issue.

a majority vote was affirmative.

Article 6. Next annual meeting date

To see if the District will vote to hold its next annual meeting April 14 th. 2018 at 9 a.m. at the Chapel-by-the-Lake in Munsonville, NH.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded. majority vote was affirmative.

A motion to adjourn at 9:17 a.m. was appropriately made and seconded. majority vote was affirmative.

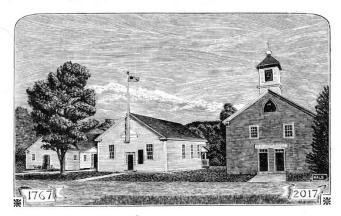
Report of the 250th Committee for 2017

The Committee for the celebration of the founding of Nelson in 1767 began meeting on June 21, 2015 and met regularly for two years. The task of the 250th Committee was to plan events for 2017. The theme "A Sense of Place" was chosen and it was our intention to celebrate the artists, musicians, authors and ordinary citizens who farmed and loved this special place for 250 years. Thanks to a grant from the town voted on at the last Town Meeting we were given \$6000 to cover the expenses of programming not only for the town residents but for the Nelson School as well. Our big day was July 8 when Proclamations were read by representatives of our state and national government, benedictions were said by the town ministers, the church and schoolhouse bells were rung proclaiming the happy day. The town Fire and Rescue Department served amazing food in spite of an impressive thunderstorm. The sky cleared and the Town Band played and the Ice Cream social happened as planned. We also had re-enactors on the Common and R. P. Hale, the Colonial printer making beautiful prints in the Town Hall. There was even a Colonial dance at 5 for those who had any energy left. All day long there was an exhibit in the Old Library of items made in Nelson. It was curated by the town archivist Bert Wingerson.

None of these events or the programs that happened throughout the year could have been done without the help of the Committee or the many dedicated volunteers who organized various activities. The members of the 250th Committee were: Ann and John Bunce, Barbara and Don Bennett, Jane Kirk, Maury Collins, Lisa Sieverts, Allison and Hunt Smith, Susan Peery, Sam Romano, Donna Kidd, Bert Wingerson and Karen Tolman. Others who were not on the Committee but who worked tirelessly to help us were Beth Draper, Linda Singer and Gordon Peery. We are grateful to the gardeners who allowed us to see their beautiful spaces and to Apple Hill for inviting us to spend an evening on their campus. Alan Rumrill gave an inspiring talk about our early history to begin the summer Library Forum season, and Rick Church and the Trails Committee provided tours of old cellar holes. The Agricultural Committee created a Colonial Garden that still exists behind the Library. Monadnock Folklore Society gave us valuable support and publicity throughout the year. We sold all the medallions and the ceramics that we commissioned as keepsakes for a total of \$2985 that we gave back to the town. R.P. Hale gave a \$90 donation to the town and sold enough prints of the town buildings that his fee was covered for the day. Jack Bradshaw served as Master of Ceremonies for the July 8th program and it reminded us of his many years as Town Moderator, and President of the NH Legislature. Special thanks also to Edie Drinkwater in the Town Office, and the Selectmen. We have so many dedicated people, both past and present that we can keep celebrating not just in 2017 but for years to come.

WHEREAS, the Town of Nelson, originally named Monadnock No. 6, was first granted in 1752 by Governor Benning Wentworth; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Nelson was first settled in 1767 by Major Breed Batchelder a large landholder who later became a Tory during the Revolutionary War; and

WHEREAS, on February 22, 1774, the town was incorporated by Governor John Wentworth as *Packersfield*, after Thomas Packer, a major land holder and the sheriff of Portsmouth; and

WHEREAS, the name was changed in 1814 to Nelson in honor of Viscount Horatio Nelson, a British admiral and naval hero of the Napoleonic Wars; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Nelson began primarily as an agricultural community, but with steams rising from four ponds to provide water power, it slowly developed industry, including the L. J. Colony Chair Co., which produced between 25,000 and 30,000 chairs annually, hiring women and children to weave the rattan seats and backs; and

WHEREAS, Nelson is also home to the longest running public contra dance in the world, the popular Monday night contra dance; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Nelson, located on height of land separating the watersheds of the Connecticut and Merrimack rivers in Cheshire County, is marking its 250th anniversary with a year of celebration and special events that reflect its rich history, culture, and the pride of its residents, now therefore be it

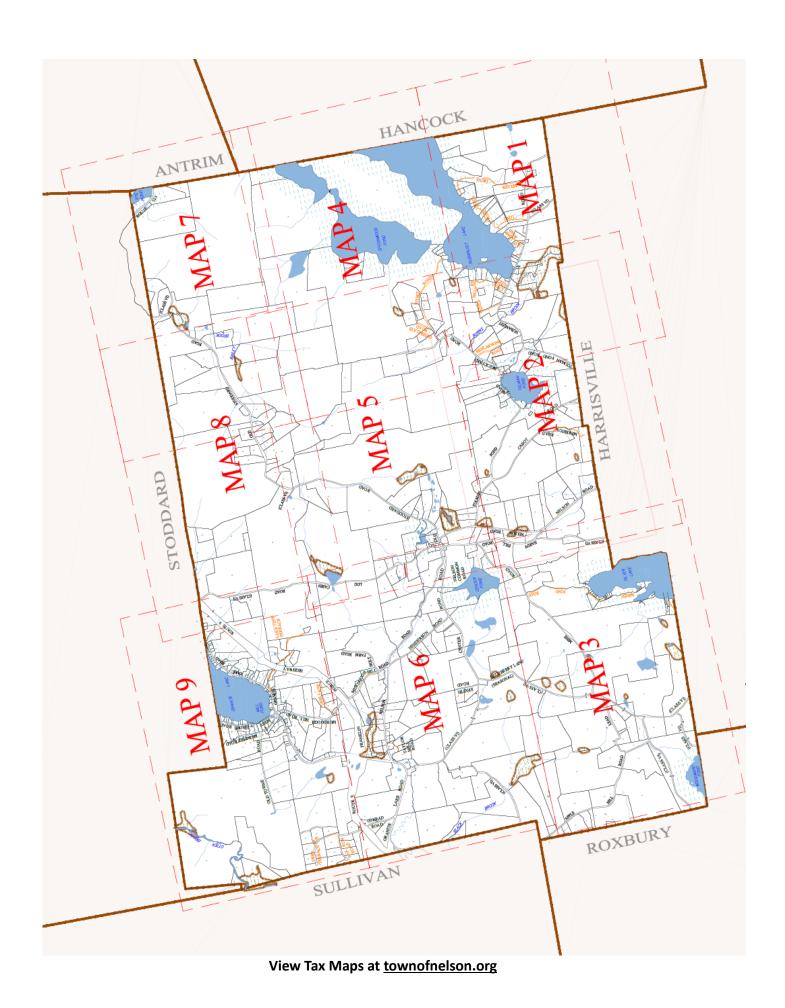

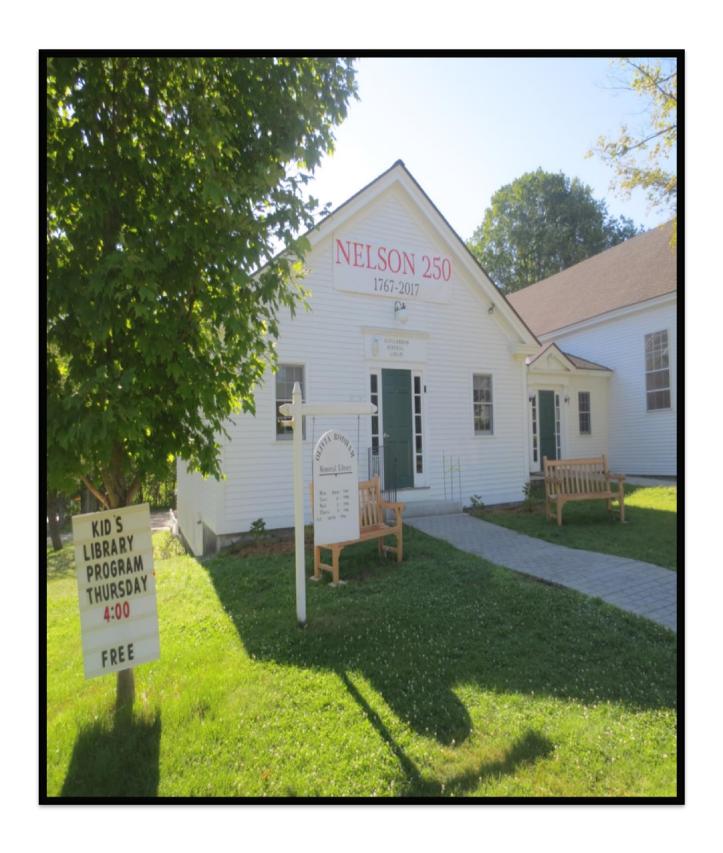
