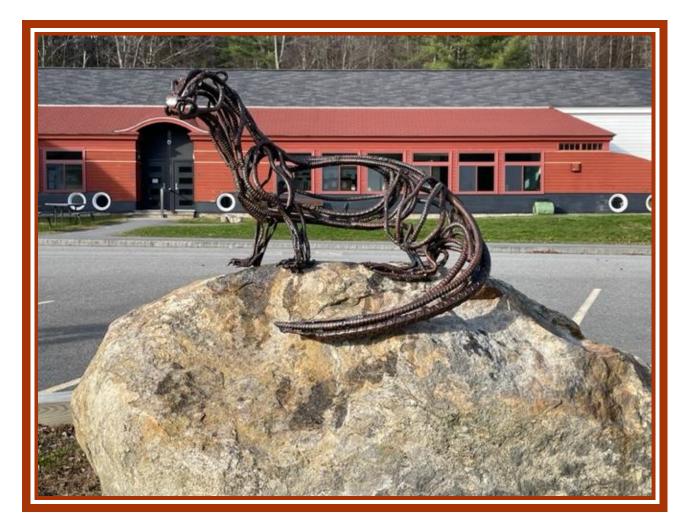

### **Sculpture project**

The concept for the Nelson School Otter Project originated in 2018. Wendy Klemperer and Kelly French were both on the Board of Directors for the Old Library where Wendy had occasionally displayed some of her sculptures on the lawn of the Old Library for the community to enjoy. Kelly thought it would be nice to have a permanent display of Wendy's work somewhere in Nelson, especially if it were placed to inspire elementary kids, and the Nelson community in general. Nelson School has a strong STEM curriculum, adding the arts makes this a STEAM curriculum. The most recent Nelson School addition had left a row of very large rocks between the parking area and Granite Lake Road, conveniently across from the swamp where otters occasionally are seen. The Nelson School mascot is the otter; the teachers often refer to the otter character and theme throughout the grades and throughout the year - the students are very proud of their otter affiliation. Rich Popovich has written a song for the school about otters. Go Otters!!!

Wendy and Kelly took a field trip to the school after an Old Library Board of Directors meeting in the summer of 2018 to scope out the possibility of otter sculptures mounted on those rocks along Granite Lake Road. In November, Wendy presented some sketches and a proposal for two sculptures. The project languished for a few years due to other priorities and commitments, then in 2021 Ed Schillemat started urging completion of the project.

In late fall of 2021, Susan Peery helped write a fundraising letter, Gordon Peery did some articles in the black fly and once the letters went out, the Keene Sentinel did a very nice front-page article. Donations started coming in, not only from the people who received the fundraising letter, but from people who read about the project in the Black Fly and the Sentinel. People were tired of COVID and wanted something fun and positive to support. A generous grant was received from the Putnam Foundation; all told, the effort raised enough money for 4 Otters, the installation, and hopefully an artist residency by Wendy in 2023.

The Otters were unveiled October 29, 2022. A few days prior, Nelson students went to Wendy's Nelson studio to experience her workshop. Wendy gave them a tour and did demonstrations of her welding and plasma cutting techniques and showed them some of her other work.



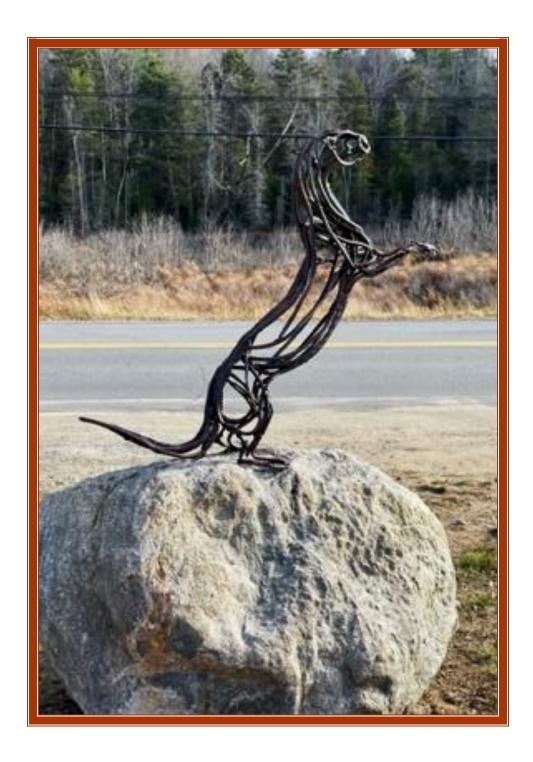
#### **About the Sculptor**

#### Bio from Vision West Contemporary.com

Wendy Klemperer was born in 1958 in Boston, MA. Raised in Cambridge and Watertown, she was most able to explore her passion for animals and nature during summers spent at her grandmother's country house in New Hampshire. The daughter of two chemists, she grew up with dual interests of art and the biological sciences, and received a bachelor degree in biochemistry from Harvard University before deciding to pursue art full time. She moved to NYC in 1980, and studied at Pratt Institute. The vitality of Klemperer's work stems from her physical involvement in the making of the pieces, a kind of action sculpture process, combined with a deeply ingrained, intuitively felt understanding of the form and movement of animals. In the early 1990's she started welding, and soon was concentrating on larger, outdoor sculpture. Scrap yards and construction sites provide raw material for her linear, gestural sculpture. She finds most of the forms already bent into the piles of rebar; her process is largely to select and cut, tack-welding the pre-existing curves into sculptural form. Wendy Klemperer lives in Brooklyn, NY and Nelson, NH. She has exhibited her work throughout the United States.







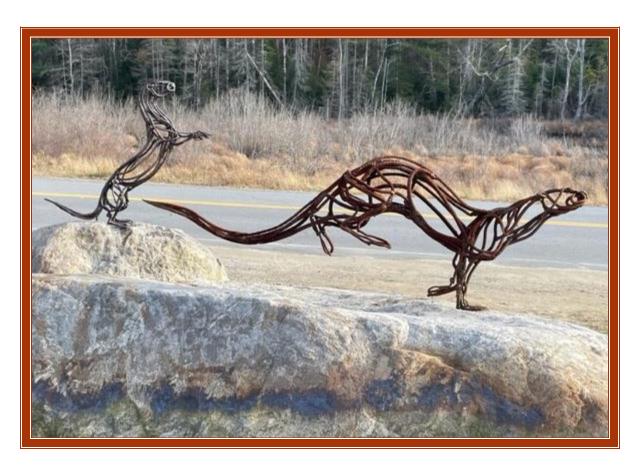

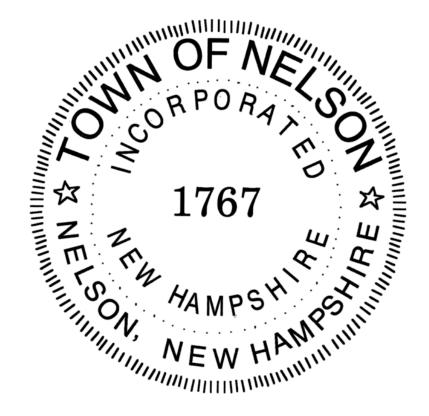




Kathleen Blaudschun "Kathy"

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Nelson Nelson, New Hampshire

#### **Opinions**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended , and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson as of December 31, 2021 and the respective changes in financial position thereof and the budget to actual comparison for the General Fund, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Basis for Opinions**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### **Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
  appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the
  Town's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, any significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United Stated of America require that the pension related information on pages 27-29 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Town of Nelson has not presented a management's discussion and analysis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined that the management's discussion and analysis is necessary to supplement, but is not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

#### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Nelson's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund schedules are fairly stated in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

#### Article 01 Choose necessary Town Officers for year ensuing

To Choose necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.

This article appears on the Official Ballot.

#### Article 02 To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,087,240.00 for general municipal operations of town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency Management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$311,468. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 03 Support of Town Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,158 for the support of the town library, \$43,993 to be raised by taxes and \$5,165 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 04 Funding of Various Social Service Agencies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,786 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$500), Home Health Care, Hospice and Community Services (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$786), Southwestern Community Services (\$500), Monadnock Region Child Advocacy Center (\$1,850), Hundred Nights Inc. (\$500), Community Volunteer Transportation Co. (\$250) and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2022, \$5,536 was paid in support of social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$210,735.00 in food, services, discounts and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0

#### Article 05 Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$108,923. The Selectmen Recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 06 Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$112,698. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 07 Add funds to Milfoil Prevention and Treatment ETF

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$35,030. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.



#### Article 08 Funding for fighting forest fires/NH reimbursement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This article has anticipated reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden in the amount of \$500. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 09 Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$62,508. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 10 Add funds to Nelson Bridge Repair/Replacement ETF

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The Selectmen are the agents to expend said funds. The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$11,155. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 11 Add funds to Road Equip. Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the town upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$79,704. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 12 Establish Capital Reserve Fund for Energy Projects

To see if the town will vote to establish a Nelson Renewable/Green Energy Project Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of supporting renewable or "Green" energy projects in Nelson, such as Solar, Wind, or other renewable energy sources as may become available and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in this fund. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 13 Re-adopt Optional Veterans' Tax Credit

To see if the Town will vote to re-adopt the Optional Veterans' Tax Credit in accordance with RSA 72:28,II for an annual tax credit on residential property of \$500. If re-adopted and approved, this article shall take effect for the 2023 property tax year. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 14 Modify the Distribution of Land Use Change Tax

To see if the town will vote to amend the current Land Use Change Tax distribution pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 IV. The current distribution to be reduced from 100% to 50% of the Land Use Change Tax collected pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 II to be deposited into the existing Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III, as authorized by RSA 79-A:25, II and the remaining 50% shall be for the use of the town in accordance with RSA 79-A:25 I. If adopted this article shall take effect April 1st, and shall remain in effect until altered or rescinded by a future vote of the town meeting. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.



#### Article 15 Paving a Section of Granite Lake Road

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000 for the purpose of paving a small section of Granite Lake Road from the J. Parker Snow bridge located in Nelson to the Sullivan Town Line including the turn-around area. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 16 Fund other patrols/details performed by Nelson PD

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$4,000 from any of the previously listed entities contracting this service. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 17 Purchase New Police Cruiser

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,000 for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new Police cruiser. \$52,000 to come from the Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. This article is upon recommendation of the Police Department. The fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was approximately \$62,508. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 18 Repair Damage & Deterioration of Library Building

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000 for purpose of repairing damage and deterioration of the Library building due to water/weather and to incorporate and install mitigation efforts, such as roof gutters, to reduce the risk of further damage. \$100,000 to come from the Town Buildings Capital Reserve fund, established for that purpose, and \$25,000 to from from taxes. The fund balance as of 12/31/2022 was \$108,923. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 19 Repairs to Fire Truck-Engine #1

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000 for the purpose of exterior body repairs to Engine #1 of the Nelson Fire Department a 2001 International. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 20 Purchase New Fire Hose

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of purchasing new fire hose to replace aging hose that no longer can meet pressure testing requirements. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 21 By Petition-Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,550 for the Game of Village Inc., a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. This money would be used to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2023 - a summer learning experience. Any children who live in Nelson and are entering 5th-8th grades may apply. This is a Petitioned article. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.



#### Article 22 By Petition - Support Nelson in Common, Non-profit

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to support the efforts of Nelson in Common; a 501(c) 3 non-profit organization, to include offsetting costs for maintaining the Nelson History website, and for costs relating to Old Home Day and other projects and communications which support the town and community. This is a petitioned article. The Selectmen do not recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 23 By Petition - Purchase and Installation of Grid Ti

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000 for the purpose of purchasing and installing a grid-tied solar array with a size of at least 17 kW DC, to be installed on the south-facing roof of the Nelson Town Hall. The array shall be of a low-profile design with black frames for the solar panels in order to minimize its visibility. Further, it is intended that the energy produced by this solar array be primarily used to supply the electrical loads created by the air-sourced heat pump heating/cooling systems that were installed in the Town Office, Town Hall, and Olivia Rodham Memorial Library in 2022. Further, to include all electrical infrastructure modifications needed to connect the output of the solar system to the electrical grid and to the heat pumps described above. This appropriation to be non-lapsing through 12/31/2024. This is a petitioned article. The Selectmen do not recommend this article 3-0.

#### Article 24 By Petition - Purchase and Installation of Dry Hyd

To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000 for the purchase and installation of a Dry Hydrant along the North Shore of Tolman Pond.

This is a petitioned article. The Selectmen do not recommend this article 3-0.

# Article 03: Adapt Zoning Amendment (by official ballot)

To see if the town will vote to approve the adoption of **Amendment No. 2** as proposed by the Nelson planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Remove the zoning amendment history found at the end of Article 1:Preamble and retain, repeat and update this zoning amendment history as a new Section 13.10 Zoning Amendment History?

The article PASSED on a ballot vote

The business portion of the meeting was held on Saturday, March 12,2022, starting at 10:00am, Lew Derby, moderator, lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance, and went over the procedural rules for a town meeting as set by the State of New Hampshire as well as rules to stay safe. The meeting began with Article 4 as Article 1, 2 and 3 were decided by ballot votes on March 8, 2022.

### Article 04: To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,043,631.00 for general municipal operations of town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency Management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$259,342.00. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Bill Dunn.

Brenna Kucinski spoke to the article referring everyone to the specifics on page 29, starting with the Board of Selectmen. Proposed is a \$1000 increase in each selectmen's salary due to the amount of time and work required for the position and is needed if we expect people to run for the position in the future. Also under Executive, the treasurer's compensation has increased as the previous treasurer John Shea pretty much worked pro bono. Brenna referred to page 30 "outside services" and the cost of everything going up. Kathy Schillemat asked about the sextons budget almost doubling. Brenna referred to page 31. Wayne Fulton retired and Rich Yeradi was hired with a wage increase from \$19-\$23 per hour. Also contributing to the increase in budget, hours are up from 5 to 15 hrs per week in order to take care of all town buildings. Also on Page 31, electricity is down due to the solar panels. Safety buildings are in need of repair, more specifically paint and drainage issues in the rear of the building. Mowing of the ball field line is up in order for the town to start using it again. Page 33 addresses the gravel pit which will be paid off in 2025 and has been and will continue to be a good investment. Page 35, cemetery budget is up due to the hiring of a designer for the new section of the cemetery that is planned. Page 38, town clerk office equipment as a new compute is needed. In regards to the Fire Department, Brenna thanked Jason Walter, who recently retired because of his family and work commitments. Joe Sarcione has been appointed as the new chief. He is a good fit with over 48 yrs experience and familiarity with the Nelson Fire Department as he had served as a member in the past. Increase to the budget is due to wage increases. In the past members never got paid for going on calls and there are plans to hire an administrative assistant. Page 45, police department, Joe Filipe has been appointed to take over for retiring Richie Pratt. Joe is more than qualified as a former Keene Police Officer, and an advanced EMT who prefers working in a small town. The police salary increased from \$25-\$30 per hour with 10-14 hours per week budgeted. Wayne Kasotas will be helping to get the department organized for the next 3 months and sometime in the future a part time deputy will be hired. Other than the increase in the office equipment, and the cost of living increase for the highway department, other departments remain stable. John Bunce said he was pleased with the new regime and wanted to thank Bill Dunn for stepping in when there was a resignation on the selectboard. He also wanted to point out that the budget we are being asked to approve is up 34% over what was spent last year and once passed will set a new tax rate for the year. Brenna pointed out the tax rate has already been set for this year at \$15.21 per thousand and is the lowest in Cheshire County. Bill Dunn proceeded to explain offsetting revenue.

The article PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 05: Support of Town Library

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46,086 for the support of the Town library, \$40,833 to be raised by taxes and \$5,253 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Susan Peery and seconded by Kathy Schillemat. Susan Peery spoke to the article and wanted to thank the whole town for supporting the library during Covid. The budget is up 5% due to an increase in salary and adding some hours to get back to where things were precovid.

The article PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 06: Funding of Various Social Service Agencies.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,536 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$500), Home Health Care Service, Hospice and Community Services (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$786), Southwestern Community Services (\$500), Monadnock Region Child Advocacy Center (\$1,850), Hundred Nights Inc. (\$500) and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2021, \$6,550 was paid in support of these social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$167,295.00 in food, services and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend these appropriations 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins. Susan Peery said she supports the article as written but hopes next year there could be an increase.

The Article PASSED on a voice vote

# Article 07: Repair, clean and restore damaged headstones .

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to repair, clean and restore damaged headstones in the Nelson cemeteries. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

Article PASSED by a voice vote.

# Article 08: Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$82,142. The Selectmen Recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

Article PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 09: Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$85,855. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collin

# Article 10: Add funds to Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$33,705. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

### Article 11: Funding for fighting forest fires/NH reimbursement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This article has anticipated reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden in the amount of \$500. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collin

The article PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 12: Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$51,485. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

The article PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 13: Add funds to the Nelson Bridge Repair/Replacement ETF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The selectmen are the agents to expend said funds. The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$40,879. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

Kathy Schillemat asked how many bridges does Nelson have? Mike Tarr replied three and Victor Pepin asked what are the three. Mike listed Old Stoddard Rd, Murdough Hill Rd and Old Rt 9 near Priscilla Walters house as the three town bridges.

The article PASSED on a voice vote

### Article 14: Repair West Shore Road Bridge

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of repairing the West Shore Road Bridge, \$40,000 to come from the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund for that purpose, and the balance to be raised by taxes. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins. Kathy Schillemat wants clarity as Mike Tarr just said this was not a bridge in town. Bill Dunn said it is considered a culvert technically but because it is under 10' but because it goes over water it is a bridge. Kathy says she is still not clear if we can use the money in this article because we said it is not a bridge. Victor Pepin said he has a house near the bridge and would like more details on the actual repair. Brenna replied bridge or not we have to repair it. The repair would involve a 40' steel reinforced slab for which the town has 5 bids. The lowest bid is for \$59,862 and work can be started in April and completed in late April or May. It also needs guardrails which Mike Tarr will put up because they are expensive. Daryl Schillemat said his question was answered as far as the bids but are the guardrails an additional \$15,000? Tom Buttrick asked if it had been okayed to use the bridge funds or does this article need to be amended? Val VanMeir wants to know if climate change and rising water levels have been taken into account by the contractors? Brenna said the bridge was designed to accommodate weight, traffic and water flow. Kathy said what Tom was getting at is, is it legally okay to use the \$40,000 bridge repair money? Also, we should be looking at all bridges in town with regard to climate change. Victor Pepin wants more specifics on the repairs itself. Will the culvert/bridge be expanded and raised up? Brenna replied replacing the culvert will not be happening as it involves DES, plus an additional \$10,000 or more and a longer wait. Mike Tarr explained the width will be the same 14' it is now with guardrails and 40' in length with is longer than what presently exists. Brenna tried to clarify everyone's confusion by adding that the State of NH doesn't consider it a bridge but the Town does, and doesn't believe there is a problem using the funds. John Wengler asks if we can amend terminology to culvert. Lew said no it cannot be amended. Victor Pepin asked what the guardrails will look like. Mike Tarr replied with the same metal guardrails that are there now. Tom Buttrick makes an amendment to add \$40,000 to potentially come from the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund if allowed for that purpose. Jeff Taylor seconded. Ethan McBrien thinks it should be left as written and the extra words are not needed.

Lew asks for any further discussion. Lew reads the amended article.

The amendment PASSED on a voice vote.

The article as amended PASSED on a voice vote.

### Article 15: Add funds to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the town upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2021 was approximately \$53,402. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

The article PASSED on a voice vote

### Article 16: Fund other Patrols/Details performed by Nelson PD

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$4,000. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded by Maury Collins.

The article PASSED by a voice vote.

### Article 17: Change Town Treasurer from elected to appointed

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a town treasurer in accordance with RSA 41:26-e, rather than electing a treasurer. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Brenna Kucinski and seconded Maury Collins.

Brenna speaks to the article stating the reason for the article is because no one has run for treasurer the past two years and this way we can try to find someone in town first, but if not, we are able to look outside of the Town of Nelson to try to find the best candidate to fill the position.

John Wengler thinks we should be trying to increase voting and not decreasing it. Daryl makes the motion to amend the article to read—authorize the selectmen to appoint a treasurer in the event one has not been elected by the town. Jeff Taylor seconded. Lew pointed out this is the way it already works. Kathy Schillemat says she supports this article as read and this is not setting a precedent as our highway, police and fire used to be elected but now are appointed. Kathy also added the town did not have a treasurer for a while after John Shea passed and it is no way to run a town. Laurie Smith added it is dictated by the state that the town must have a treasurer. Brenna reiterated that the point is, if no one runs or is elected we have to appoint someone in town, and if we can't find anyone in town qualified and willing to take the job, we are not able to look

outside of our town for the best candidate. Brenna also added there were many open positions this year where no one ran, and treasurer paperwork ends up falling on Edie which is not fair. Keenan Blanchard refers to the RSA and asks exactly what does that say? Lew reads the RSA. Jim Newcombe urged everyone to trust the selectmen to make the right choice. Susan Peery added it is a very specific skill set and it would be best to leave as written to get the most qualified person and best outcome. Daryl withdraws his motion for amendment. Lew back to the article as written.

The article PASSED by a voice vote.

### Article 18: By Petition-Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1950 for the Game of Village Inc, a 501C 3 non-profit organization, to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2022- a summer learning experience. All children who live in Nelson and are entering 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade may attend. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Kathy Schillemat and seconded Maury Collins

Margaret Iselin spoke to the article. Bill Dunn says he has never received any help sending his boys although he is not asking for any just asking for clarity on the article. Al Stoops makes the motion to change attend to qualify. Tom Buttrick says it needs to stay as written explaining people have to apply and the application is reviewed before any financial aid is approved. Margaret Iselin explains this same article is presented yearly. Al Stoops withdraws his motion.

The article PASSED by a voice vote.

The Olivia Rodham Memorial Library Board of Trustees continues its long tradition of supporting and enhancing the library patrons' experience at the Nelson library. As the Library's mission statement promises it is dedicated to providing materials and services to its patrons. The Library serves as a center, available to help people of all ages continue their education and add to their enjoyment and appreciation of reading and learning.

The five trustees and three alternates meet monthly (except July), with the library director, Kris Finnegan to discuss library matters. These include programing, budget and review of policies and procedures. Better air filtration is important and aided by a new air purifier in the library. As Kris has highlighted in her report we are offering in- person programs in the Town Hall for safer spacing of guests. It is nice to see the return of programs and events such as cookbook group luncheons and book groups. We have all missed being together and are so happy for their return.

The Trustees want to thank our outgoing trustees Sara Marean and Gretchen Ezell for their caring and thoughtful service to the town and to the library. We know we will see them at the library and at ongoing events that they worked so hard to make possible. We would like to welcome our new members for 2022 Anita Flanagan and Jan Perry and our new alternates Jennifer Pepin, Karen Hersey and Judith Putzel.

We have been very fortunate over the last couple of years to have our wonderful library, and our great staff ready to help us find books and videos, offer zoom events that helped us stay connected and supported through very difficult times. A special thanks to the Friends of the Library who continued to organize the Old Home Day book sale, a fun event for all and their generous gift to the Library. The Library board wants to say thank you to the people of Nelson, your patronage and support makes our library a place where we can all come together and be enriched.

# 2022 Report of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library

This has been a Covid recovery year. We have resumed adult and children's programs indoors. To do this we have started using the town hall for in-person programs: it allows larger groups and safer spacing, while reducing interference from library business. We have added an air purifier with HEPA filter to the library. We continue to provide a children's program on Facebook Live, with new books or a story time with puppets; and we continue to post links to Zoom events hosted by regional libraries. Totals for all programs [below] include attendees where known.

We have started both a monthly cookbook group, where we meet for discussion and a luncheon; and a library book group, reading novels and nonfiction. In addition, we order materials for four other book groups in town.

The Nelson Library services include internet and wireless access. People are able to sit in the parking lot and use the internet 24/7, or use it in the library during open hours. We also provide downloadable e-books, audiobooks, and magazines. You can visit our website at <u>nelsonlibrary.org</u> for more, including a community events calendar and other community information.

# What the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library offers you:

- Our library is free and open to the community.
- Nelson residents may borrow books, audio books on CD, magazines, a telescope, DVDs, kids games and puzzles, puppets, and craft kits.
- Web page: <u>nelsonlibrary.org</u> with a calendar of town events, and links to local groups. More online services can be accessed in the library or from home on the web page, including downloadable e-Books, audio books, and Kindle books and magazines.
- Online services include library computers, wifi printers, Zoom programs and FaceBook Live children's programs. We hosted 25 children's programs on FaceBook Live this year, and our web page logged 1,425 viewers.
- Special programs, such as the *Monadnock Music* family program; *Saving Energy on Cooling and Heating your Home* with Wes Golomb; *Music, Memory and Synesthesia* with Paul Klemperer and Garrett Cameron; *Creative Yoga for Kids* with Robyn Anderson; *Spark Joy*, a Zoom event following Marie Kondo techniques; *Whales and Seals* with the UNH Marine Docents; and *Restoring a Frank Lloyd Wright Residence* with Bill Waterston.
- Monthly and weekly programs: Coffee hour every Saturday, book group, cookbook book group with a potluck.

**Meetings.** The library and the meeting room on the lower level were used for meetings by many community groups: the Agricultural Commission, Conservation Board, Friends of the Library, Library Trustee meetings, Monadnock Folklore Society, Cemetery Board, and Library COOP, as well as the Friends' book sale.

Contributions to the library in time, talent, and material goods. The library is thankful for the hours that volunteers put in this year at the library. The volunteers, were: weekly volunteer Martha Collins, also Gordon Peery for technical advice and Black Fly newsletter library promotions. Our monetary supporters in 2022 were the Library Friends group, NH Charitable Foundation, Janet Fiderio in memory of Shirley Creamer Fiderio, Marcia Sexton in memory of Carol Heath and Celia Wiechert, and Alma McDonald in memory of Ron Slayton. Many donations are made also of actual books, audio-visual materials, and magazines. The Friends of the Library had a fundraiser book sale during Old Home Week, collecting \$564.80. Thank you to everyone who donated. This money goes to purchase books, DVDs and other items.

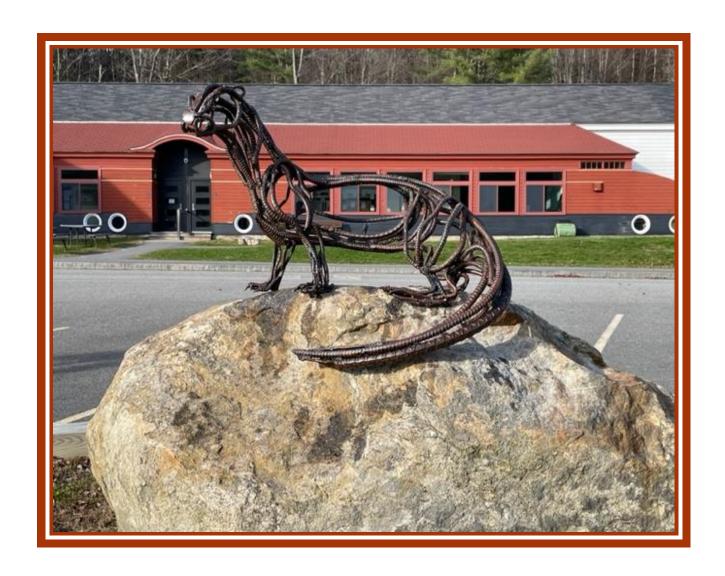

This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. The Boards recommends this article. (Majority vote required)

#### **Article 4: Special Education and Tuition Trust Fund**

This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. The Board recommends this article. (Majority vote required)

The Mission of Nelson Elementary School is to instill strength of spirit and ignite a love of learning.

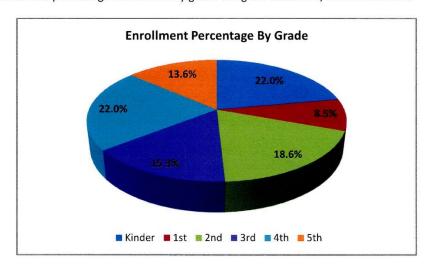

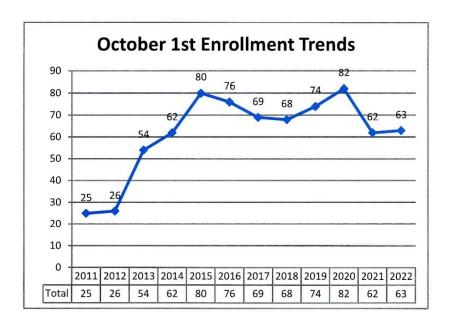
#### **Enrollment**

#### Facility/Maintenance

With continued support from the ESSER grants, we have been planning the construction of two outdoor pavilion structures that will enhance the academic and community functions of Nelson School. Progress on this project will be partially contingent on addressing a drainage issue that was identified this past fall. The school is working diligently in conjunction with our board to ensure that needs are addressed in an efficient and cost-effective manner.

This past October, the community vision that resulted in the Otter Project finally came to fruition with local artist Wendy Klemperer's installation of four otter statues in front of the school. Thanks to the generosity of the Putnam Foundation as well as over 100 community donors, we were able to raise over \$22,000 for this project. We hosted an unveiling event in conjunction with a few other school events to showcase the work that Wendy did for us. Additionally, she offered up her studio space for a tour, so all of our students were able to visit and see her work in action. We hope to collaborate with Wendy to provide an artist-in-residency program for students during the 2023-2024 school year as well.

#### Faculty/Staff

All classroom teachers return this year to Nelson School. We welcomed two new specialists to our staff: Laura Rosenthal (Physical Education) and Madison Gubata (Music). In addition, we welcomed a new tutor, Heidi Schwieger, to assist in meeting student needs, and Donna Ebert, to fill our part-time Title I Tutor position. We also combined the Food Services and Custodial duties into a full-time position, and welcomed Joshua Neff to fill this role.

#### Community Support / Service/Volunteers

At Nelson School, we are endlessly thankful for the strong support we receive from various individuals and organizations in the community. The staff enjoys generous support from our Parent-Teacher Organization. This past year, some examples of their support have included supplemental classroom funds and a new book binder for school-wide projects. The PTO also hosted a Halloween event that occurred in conjunction with our October Pancake Breakfast, and volunteers from the PTO came to assist with our Harvest Feast. We greatly appreciate all of the support.

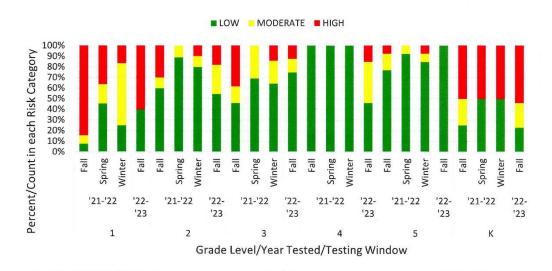
In conjunction with the PTO, the Nelson Agricultural Committee hosted the Fall Farmers' Market and Welcome Back BBQ, which was an excellent opportunity for our community to come together. Many students and their families attended and enjoyed local goods, music, and a little contra dancing. Our 5th graders hosted our Fall Pancake Breakfast, and were massively successful in bringing back this long-standing traditional event.

We have also experienced the revival of the First Friday Friends reading program. The number of community volunteers this year made it possible to connect all students in Grades K-3 with a reading buddy. We have thoroughly enjoyed this renewed connection with our community members.

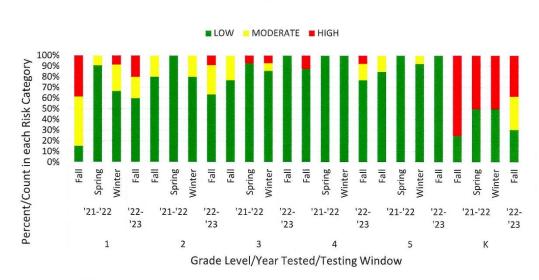
As our ability to collaborate with outside organizations has resumed, we have continued to partner with select organizations to provide health screenings for our students. The Keene Lions Club provided vision screening for our K-2 students, and Cheshire Smiles provided dental screenings for students in Grades K-3. 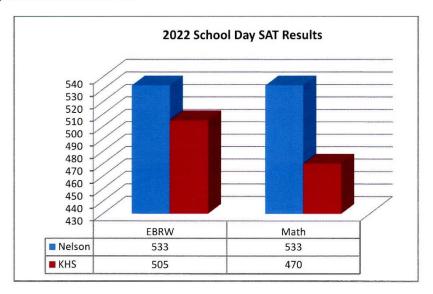




<sup>\*\*</sup>Results for all students who were at the school at the end of the assessment administration\*\*

#### **Academic Programs**

We are continuing to work on curriculum and our SAU-wide shift to competency-based assessments. Staff meet regularly to analyze data in order to accurately address gaps in student learning and develop community enrichment opportunities. In addition to classroom instruction, students attend weekly specials, including Music, Art, Spanish, and Physical Education. Classroom teachers continue to collaborate with the Harris Center to provide outdoor education opportunities in our outdoor classroom space. One of our goals is to expand our capacity for outdoor education through continued professional development and community engagement.

#### Co-Curricular

As of the 2020-2021 school year, the Aftercare Program was put on hold due to the emergence of COVID-19. The possibility of resuming an Aftercare Program was discussed last spring, but we were unable to start the program again due to staffing and less of a need than anticipated.

We have been able to start offering Clubs again, with this past November and December seeing the return of Sewing Club. Older students learned how to sew on a machine and made tote bags, while younger students learned hand sewing skills, with some assistance from some older Sewing Club helpers. These offerings were well attended and we look forward to offering more after school Club opportunities as we move toward the spring.

#### **Special Recognition**

Nelson School would like to recognize the dedication displayed by the school board and community members to supporting students and staff during this past year. We would also like to recognize the ongoing efforts and perseverance of staff and students in the face of the changing landscape of education.

#### **Keene High School Update**

Improving student behavior at KHS has been a primary focus since the community meetings last year. A safe school environment is paramount to the social-emotional and academic development of our students. The KHS school community strives to be a vibrant learning community, but breaches to the "code of conduct" have at times created uncomfortability for both students and adults. Some areas of concern since the community meetings have improved. There is less wandering in the halls and less vandalism. Other areas of concern still exist. The school administration in collaboration with the Building Leadership Council are employing different systems to stem some of the remaining issues. While this will take time and continue to be a focus, it is achievable through the concerted efforts of everyone–educators, students, and parents.

#### **Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment**

As a SAU, it is integral that curriculum is cohesively aligned through rigorous competency-based expectations so our students are fully prepared to enter high school with the requisite knowledge and skills for success in all content areas. Over the past eighteen months, building administrators and teachers at the K-8 level across the SAU have collaborated to create a paradigm for teaching and learning that is transparent, rigorous, and student-centered. The comprehensive competency-based framework is being piloted at certain levels and will be entirely implemented at the start of the 2023-2024 school year. Any shifts in instructional practices are intended to personalize learning to enable all students to concretize essential knowledge and skills in a transferable manner. Assessments provide an opportunity for students to showcase their learning through a variety of modalities. The reporting of learning will enable teachers to provide immediate intervention to close learning gaps; parents and students will have clarity around areas of strength and concern.

#### **Learn From Home Days**

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, we have needed to respond to a number of logistical issues that have arisen along the way. One of these practices was utilizing Learn from Home Days during inclement weather when school would typically be canceled. These Learn from Home Days allowed for school to still be held and counted. Learn from Home Days were approved by the school boards of Keene, Chesterfield, Westmoreland, Harrisville, Marlow, and Nelson. Schools utilize a variety of ways to engage with students in their learning both synchronous and asynchronous. We continue to gather feedback on Learn from Home Days to meet the needs of all our students whenever there is inclement weather that makes it unsafe for students to come to school.

#### **Workforce Shortage**

SAU 29, like most employers in New Hampshire and across the country, is experiencing operational challenges due to labor shortages. Over the last several years we have seen higher turnover and smaller applicant pools for open positions. Areas of critical shortage are entry-level positions, specialized teaching positions, particularly at the high school level, and related service providers such as Speech Language Pathologists and School Psychologists. To help reduce the impact of existing market conditions on the organization, Human Resources has devoted more resources to expand recruiting activities to include on-site job fairs, radio advertising, and an increased presence on social media, while continuing to explore new recruiting outlets.

In addition to labor shortages, SAU 29 is also grappling with a steady increase in staff absences over the last several years. This challenges the administrative team on a daily basis to cover absences while maintaining building services. Increased absences inevitably put additional strain on those who cover for absent colleagues. To help mitigate these conditions, Human Resources is working closely with our insurance vendors to provide programs geared toward enhancing employee overall wellness. This includes a recently released and expanded Employee Assistance Program (EAP) which provides cuttingedge benefits that comprehensively provide support across a broad spectrum of life's challenges. The Human Resources department continues to provide individualized support to employees and their supervisors as they navigate work/life balance issues.

Despite these continued, challenging times, the administrative team and our dedicated staff have demonstrated resilience, patience and perseverance and rise up to meet these daily challenges for the benefit of our students.

#### 2022 Annual Selectmen's Report

The past year was consumed with applying for grants for both specifically identified projects and other monies that could be applied toward needs in the future. Although some will argue that this is not "free" money, it alleviates the necessity to raise, by local taxation, the amounts needed to pay for the items we were able to purchase for our Town Buildings and Departments. While it is true that the money causes more debt, it will not be incurred at the local level. The money was available and to leave it sitting on the table would have been pointless.

The Select Board and the Town owe a deep debt of gratitude to our Administrative Assistant, Edie Drinkwater, for her tireless work in securing these series of grants that have resulted in large amounts of money being acquired for our town. The process was grueling and her determination dauntless. The grants were a combination of available funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) multiple Locality Community Grants and a FEMA grant program related to COVID-19. Our largest accomplishment to date is our new heating and cooling system for the Town Offices, Town Hall and Town Library. Most of these buildings never had air conditioning which will be a great improvement for the people who work in and use these buildings. This project was completely grant funded and also complied with the town's goals of becoming more energy efficient. It is comprised of heat pumps that use the existing duct work for more consistent heat throughout the buildings with propane backup. This system was sorely needed as all the heating units were in poor condition, one of which had actually failed in early spring. Eversource has stated their commitment to the goal of buying totally green sources of electricity by 2030.

Other major funding received includes the following:

The highway department was able to purchase a one-ton Dodge dump truck along with a new plow and sander to replace their previous one that was 24 years old and in need of serious repairs. The cost was covered by using funds received from a variety grants.

\$21,000 for Bridge Repair, that can be used for any of the three State designated bridges in town, arrived as expected by year's end.

Other items the Town has received to date include:

- a Computer/Server for the Police Department.
- a Police Department base radio.
- Other miscellaneous equipment for the Police cruiser.
- Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief Gear from Locality Grant Funding.
- Pagers and Radios for the Fire Department.
- Gear for New Members of the Fire Department.
- Jaws of Life for the Fire Department.

A whopping sum of money for a small town like Nelson!

This year has brought a welcome return to activities that were sorely missed during the COVID surge. We saw a well-attended craft fair that was accompanied by an absolutely gorgeous day with food provided by the Nelson Congregational Church (NCC). A return to Memorial Day celebrations including the Nelson Town Band and a service at the cemetery by the local minister of the NCC, Eliot Fay. An absolutely terrific Old Home Day celebration that included the return of the road races, games on the Common for children and adults, a book sale, musical programs, a sheep herding demonstration, that was both intriguing and educational, a fabulous chicken barbeque sponsored by the NCC, the water-ball challenge for young adults put on by our Fire Department (I think a few adults may have joined in too), and the culmination of the day, the return to the softball game! It was a hot but dry day that many were able to attend and enjoy. The last major town event was the return of the ice cream social provided again by the church accompanied by the Nelson Town Band. Another hot day that was made more enjoyable with yummy ice cream and toppings. The return of these events afforded many the opportunity to again socialize with each other and remember why we love this town so much!

A very unfortunate event caused the resignation of our wonderful Town Sexton, Rich Yerardi. Many had commented on how much cleaner the buildings were and how tidy the lawns were kept. He was a versatile employee who fit in perfectly with our needs. Unfortunately, he was involved in a very serious car accident that left him unable to continue with us. We thank him from the bottom of our hearts for all his hard work and wish him the very best in his recovery. We will miss him! We are grateful to have found a local person, Tim McEachern, who has agreed to take on the duties going forward. We are not only relieved to find someone willing to fill the position, but are particularly encouraged that he is a resident of the town as well. We welcome him into the fold.

The past year for the Select Board has been a busy one with many projects to manage and many issues to overcome. It has also been a year fraught with resignations. Luckily the town has been very fortunate to have residents who were willing to step in to fill out the terms. The resignation of Maury Collins was filled by the very capable Mike Blaudschun, who luckily had past experience of being on the Select Board. We were also fortunate with the unanticipated resignation of Al Guida, due to health concerns, to find Don Carlisle who agreed to fill in for the rest of this year. Although new to town politics he is a quick study and brings a good business background to the board. We are functioning well due to the hard work and dedication of these two new members. I personally want to thank them for their service. It is a hard, time consuming, job.

We look forward to 2023 with many new challenges ahead. The Select Board strives to make, what we feel are, the best choices for our town. I believe I can speak for the entire board in saying that we are very lucky to be surrounded by town employees who truly care about this town and want to do their very best for all of us. We are a lucky town!

# Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Report 2022

As your Town Clerk and Tax Collector I do everything I can to meet your needs and to have my office provide excellent service to all residents. Being the only person in the office, since covid there has been no deputy clerk, has its challenges. I would ask anyone, who is interested in being the deputy clerk, to call or stop in and get an overview of a very interesting part time position. In order to take over as town clerk/tax collector the person filling the position must reside in Nelson. To be comfortable, it takes about year, to train and get certified in motor vehicle, vital statistics, elections and the many other duties that are required to service all of you. I will tell you there is never a dull moment. Some larger towns separate the Town Clerk and Tax Collector positions, but being both fills the calendar from January 1 to December 31 with no problem. So please, if you are at all interested, contact me.

We had three elections this year: the Town Meeting, the State Primary and General election. The Primary Election held on Sept 13<sup>th</sup> had 187 cast ballots. The General Election held on Nov 8<sup>th</sup> had 365 cast ballots. We currently have 466 registered voters which is down significantly from recent years. Elections in this town could not happen so efficiently without all the people who volunteer to help from the ballot clerks to the readers, counters and watchers. Anyone is interest in joining us, please reach out.

New Hampshire law states that all dogs must be registered by April 30<sup>th</sup> of each year. I send out post cards to all dog owners, in hopes of getting your dogs registered in a timely manner and reminding you if their rabies is not up to date. I love dogs but the town clerk part of the job is probably the most tedious and stressful of all the jobs I perform. For some reason, even though it doesn't cost a lot of money, people forget about it until they are late and there are penalties assessed. You can register for the coming year starting in January either by coming into the office or by mail. The dog application for a license is on our town website. The cost is \$3.00 for the first dog of a senior over 65, \$7.50 for a neutered or spayed dog and \$10.00 for an unaltered male or female.

I am happy to report the property tax rate for 2022 was 14.12 per thousand dollars of assessed value. We have one of the lowest tax rates in the area. Edie and the selectboard deserve a lot of credit for keeping the rate low and stable over the past few years. I'm sure everyone would agree they deserve a lot of credit and it is much appreciated.

#### 2022 REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The Town's continued participation in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool (NH-PDIP) provides the stability and security required by state law. The NH-PDIP combines trust funds from all member Towns state-wide into a conservatively-invested and professionally-managed portfolio.

The NH-PDIP provided increasing investment returns during 2022 due to multiple interest rate increases by the Federal Reserve, which positively affected PDIP fund performance. Interest earnings on the Town's trust funds invested at NH-PDIP totaled \$ 15,981.44 in 2022.

Voters at Town Meeting approved a total of \$ 100,000 in new contributions to six existing trust funds in 2022.

Expenditures of \$ 44,250 from two funds were approved.

Details of all trust fund deposits, withdrawals, and year-ending balances are shown in the chart which appears in the Town Report.

#### 2022 REPORT OF THE NELSON CEMETERY BOARD

As we look back on 2022, the Nelson Cemetery Board can proudly point to a number of achievements on behalf of the citizens of our beautiful town.

We continue to move forward with our plans for a new cemetery ("Cemetery Three"), but have also opened up some previously unused ground in Cemetery Two to accommodate burials until the new cemetery has been completed. As the first step in the development of Cemetery Three, this summer we had four test pits dug to determine the water levels on the property, which lies across the street from the existing Nelson Cemeteries. Our next step is to determine the elevation levels of the property – a critical step in the layout. This will take place in the spring.

The property referred to as "Cemetery Two" sits beside the original Nelson Cemetery on Cemetery Hill Road, just up the hill from the center of town. When it was originally laid out, an oval gravel road circled the perimeter; over the years grass was allowed to cover most of the oval, and today all that remains is the driveway that starts at the old cemetery and curves over to Cemetery Hill Road. Why is this important? As it turns out, much of the area inside the oval was never used for burials. As the shortage of burial sites became more critical, the Cemetery Board decided to use this space for more plots. Consequently, we are once again able to offer cemetery plots to Nelson residents. However, plot sales will be limited to two plots per family until Cemetery Three has been established.

The Memorial Day service conducted at old Cemetery One was beautiful and moving. Following the service, Cub Scouts from Nelson Cub Scout Pack 530 and Keene Troop 302 planted flowers on the graves of our veterans. Many thanks to all of them.

Cemetery Board members spent a number of spring and fall days cutting back brush in old Cemetery One and the Munsonville Cemetery. Using chain saws, loppers and clippers, we restored a sense of order to the borders of both cemeteries. In June, King Pine Tree Service removed a number of dead and dying trees and limbs that threatened both visitors to the cemetery and the 200 year old headstones in the cemetery. Mother Nature intervened with a tree whose removal had been put off for another time. A freak wind storm blew it down, but it miraculously missed every single headstone. A tree service was called in to remove the remains. Regular tree maintenance will be part of our plan going forward. We also plan to continue cleaning discolored, moss-covered headstones to restore their beauty. Peterborough Marble and Granite has completed the repairs to the broken and fallen headstones in Cemetery One. A few more have toppled since they completed their work, but not enough to require another warrant article for repair. Once the legal issues with the Munsonville Cemetery are resolved, we will start to fix the headstones there. The hardest part of being a member of the Nelson Cemetery Board is saying goodbye to friends and neighbors. This year was another difficult one as we saw the passing of Kathy Blaudschun, Priscilla Walter, Barry Tolman, Sam Osherson, Michael Stewart, Marilyn Houck, Philip Kohl and Seth Tolman. My apologies if I omitted anyone – it was not my intent. Due to ever rising costs, the Cemetery Board has made the difficult decision to increase the cost of purchasing a plot. A single 5' x10' plot now costs \$500, while a 5' x 5' cremation plot costs \$300. The single plot has sufficient space for one full burial or four cremated remains, while the cremation plot accommodates two cremated remains. In addition, four granite cornerstones are required to delineate each plot; the price of the cornerstones is still to be determined. Contact Cemetery Board chair Elaine Giacomo if you are interested in purchasing a plot.

My deepest thanks to my amazing fellow Cemetery Board members, and to Michael Shawver, who continues to do a fantastic job maintaining our cemeteries. In addition, we want to thank Mike Tarr and Nick Barrett for removing the brush that we cut back, and Edie and the Select Board for their valuable input. # 2022 REPORT OF NELSON AGRICULTURAL COMMISSION

Your Agricultural Commission is working hard to promote agriculture in Nelson and assist residents who wish to learn how to raise their own food.

With in person events not possible in the spring of 2022 due to the Covid-19 pandemic, out reach into the community and beyond was done electronically through a monthly article in the new Nelson in Common Black Fly Express. As well as the monthly article, there is an Agricultural Commission webpage on the Nelson in Common with links to valuable information. Please check it out.

The seed catalog located in the library was very popular in 2022 and many varieties of seed were grown in Nelson. Once again, your Agricultural Commission took this to heart and solicited seed for the 2022 growing year from seed vendors. The seeds have been repackaged to share the wealth to as many town residents as possible.

The Agricultural Commission is asking residents that "check out" open source seeds from the library to grow at least one crop with the intent to save some seed to return to the library and in turn share with your neighbors.

In 2022we were told the Colonial Garden needed to be relocated, still behind the library but not next to the building. The news to move was late in the season, too late to dig up plants. Instead we covered the new location with tarp and will be transplanting the Colonial Garden plants when appropriate in spring. This is a larger space and we envision a new section with a variety of themes over the years to come.

We are actively seeking out Cheshire county residents wishing to share their knowledge with the community for our lecture series. If you want to hear someone speak on a specific topic, please share your ideas with us for this very popular series.

# **2022 Annual Nelson Conservation Commission Report**

In 2022, the Conservation Commission welcomed new member Nina Iselin and bade farewell to our devoted chair, Kathy Schillemat. Anne McBride stepped down as an alternate member. The current commission regular members are Janet Yardley, chair; Dave Birchenough; Kathleen Vetter; and Nina Iselin. We are recruiting one additional regular member. Alternate members are Tome Newcombe and John Taylor-Maule. Brenna Kucinski continues as the liaison between the commission and the Select Board.

# **Partridge Woods**

We continue to work with the Trails Committee to maintain existing trails, upgrade signs, create hiking guides and create new trails as needed. A comprehensive map with guides to the trails and natural history of the area is nearing completion with the help of Antioch. The new Parking area on Old Stoddard Road is now open and connects to the Holt Trail with a short connector Trail, Priscilla's Way, and a new bridge across Bailey Brook. More permanent signs for the parking area will be installed in the spring after the ground has thawed. The parking area on Homestead Lane will be used only for trail maintenance, search and rescue and potential logging in the future. The parking on private property for access to the Kulish Ledge and Bailey Brook Trails has been closed by the landowner. The new parking area allows for access to Kulish Ledges and Bailey Brook via the Holt Trail. We have completed all the requirements of the grant from LWCF. The Harris Center holds the conservation easement and monitors that easement yearly. As required by the Select Board at the time of the acquisition of Partridge Woods, no property tax revenues are used to fund operation or improvements to Partridge Woods. We use money from the Land Use Change Tax (money paid by land owners who take land out of current use) to fund on-going projects at Partridge Woods. The residual monies from the LWCF grant are held in reserve to fund future conservation projects or acquisitions that need to have funds available on short notice.

# **Lake Host Program Support**

We continue to support the Lake Host Programs at Nubanusit Lake and Granite Lake. Silver Lake is looking to expand their program to cover more days of the week. This program involves education about aquatic invasive species (AIS) and offers complimentary inspections of boats and trailers for signs of AIS. The costs of these programs have increased due to both expanding hours of coverage as well as an increase in pay rate from around \$10/hr to \$15/hr. Boater surveys at the ramps show that 2% to 12% of the boats inspected either came from or planned to go to an infested body of water. Prevention is worth many pounds of cure, especially since there is often not any cure but only containment requiring expensive mitigation on an annually basis. Our support for the Lake Host programs is funded by the money added to the Milfoil Trust fund voted on by warrant article each year at Town Meeting. The amount of the money added each year has not changed for many years. The money from the trust fund covers only a small percentage of the cost of the Lake Host Program.

### **Conservation Easements**

The conservation Commission holds conservation easements on several properties in Nelson. We have formalized our process of monitoring those easements on a yearly basis. Some easements are jointly held with the Harris Center.

# **Invasive Barberry Pull**

The Conservation Commission again this year worked with the Harris Center pulling Barberry on the Bailey Brook Trail. It was gratifying to see the huge piles of pulled barberry from last year's work party shriveling and not re-rooting. The Keene State College interns working with the Harris Center had staked a monitoring plot and counted the number of barberry plants pulled last year and returned this year to repeat the pull and count. The number of barberry plants in the staked plot was 30% of the previous year and all were small diameter shoots.

# Roadside Clean up

On April 23 we had a dedicated cadre of volunteers who set off on the roadways of Nelson to pick up the litter from the prior year. We thanked them for their work with either bags of daffodil bulbs or wildflower seeds.

# **Wetland Permit review**

The process of receiving the wetland and shoreline permits has improved markedly. Now the applications are received by the Town Clerk prior to being submitted to DES so that the Conservation Commission can review them expeditiously. We are planning some public information sessions on various conservation topics in 2023.

With 2022 now behind us, I have now had the honor of serving the Town of Nelson for a full year. Departmentally, we have made some significant improvements including upgrading of equipment, some internal organization, and various plans for the future. One of the most significant future plans is the anticipated purchase of a new cruiser as the 2004 Ford Expedition has been removed from service. Much of these changes are business as usual for a police department and I will strive to continue to advance the department further in the future.

Hopefully most folks in town have now noticed more frequent patrols. These patrols should increase through 2023 as we hope that we will be able to find one or two more officers in 2023 and will subsequently have more frequent patrols. # 2022 TOWN OF NELSON ROAD AGENT REPORT

As the past two winters, the winter months in 2022 were very similar to these months in 2020 and 2021. They continued to be quiet for the Road Crew. Again, we did not have an overwhelming number of snowstorms; the snowfalls we did see were light to moderate often with it changing to rain. This kept our accumulations low; therefore, we didn't have a lot of clean-ups and didn't need to find room for more snow. Once again, the Spring months were not as easy for mud season. The usual muddy spots did give us issues; however, they were not enough to cause road closures as they were in 2021.

With no special projects scheduled in 2022, several vehicle maintenance and repairs were able to be done. This was a year for the biannual crushing at the Gilsum Gravel Pit. The hired company was there for two weeks with 6,660 yards of materials being processed.

In 2022 the Town did receive a Government Grant. With the 1998 One Ton Dodge Pickup needing thousands of dollars worth of work and no "useful life remaining" it was decided to use a portion of this grant to replace the old Dodge Pickup with a new one. The new truck was received in October fully equipped with a plow, sander, and dump body. This new One Ton Dodge Pickup was put into service immediately.

Fortunately, the fall weather was, once again, quiet. We were able to get all of our fall maintenance completed. This included grading of roads, cleaning of ditches, upkeep of culverts, roadside mowing, the removal of any hazardous trees, along with the usual hauling and stockpiling of winter sand from the Gilsum Pit.

As always, thanks go out to Nick Barrett for his many hours of hard work this past year.

The Highway Department does appreciate updates on road conditions in your area. The Road Crew will respond to any problems in a timely manner using the tools and materials made available to us.

### 2022 REPORT OF THE NELSON PLANNING BOARD

In 2022, Planning Board membership included: Gordon Perry (Chair until October upon leaving the Board), Ethan McBrien, Vice Chair (term expires March 2024), Dave Bower (March 2023), Mary Cornog (former Chair whose term expired March 2022), John Wengler (first elected March 2022 with a term expiring March 2025 and elected chair in November 2022), and Selectboard representatives Maury Collins (January-June) and Mike Blaudschun (June to December). New members and alternates are welcome.

The Board was busy with 8 meetings including one subdivision approval (unanimous approval of the White Property proposal; a presentation by the Southwest Region Planning Commission on planning topics, and an Eversource presentation about inadvertent tree cutting on town-designated Scenic Roads.

In one interesting case, the Cucchis first notified the Board in March 2021 of their intent on converting their multi-unit property to condominium ownership. In September, the Cucchis returned to request a letter from the Board that it had not have authority over the matter. The Board noted that the Subdivision Rules include condominium conveyance in the definition of a subdivision — and thus subject to Board review—but the Selectboard intervened with the opinion that only a Zoning Ordinance would have legal standing in the matter. At a later emergency joint-meeting called by the Select Board, the Planning Board voted 2-1 to sign the letter of non-authority requested by the property owner.

The Board also updated and approved the Nelson Planning Board Policy Handbook. Planning Board policies and procedures are largely governed by State Regulations; this document distills those regulations into something specifically relevant for our Town.

Looking forward, the Board plans a comprehensive review and update of the Nelson Zoning Ordinance. During 2022, the Nelson Selectboard highlighted two areas that need to be improved. First, Articles 11 and 12 need to be clarified to improve the control of Alternative Development Plans. Second, the Selectboard believes that the Subdivision Regulations that include condominium conveyances within the definition of a subdivision must be included in the Zoning Ordinance to be legally enforceable.

The Board is interested in community input about these and other Zoning Ordinance with regards to consistency, clarity and potential impact on our town. A series of public hearings are planned. All Board-approved amendments will be submitted to the public ballot associated with the Town Meeting in March, 2024. The Board meets in public the second Thursday of every month.

Finally, the Board wishes to thank Gordon Perry both for his many years of service to and his vision for the Board which we hope to carry forward.

# Highlights of 2022

This year, we assisted the Selectboard in the selection of Air-Source Heat Pumps for the Library, Town Offices, and Town Hall. The committee's recommendation of a solution that prioritized efficiency was not selected.

The Nelson Town Buildings Committee serves as an advisory committee to the Nelson Selectboard, focused on the Nelson Town Buildings which include:

- Town Offices (Old Brick School House)
- Town Hall
- Library (responsibility shared with the Library Trustees)
- Safety Building
- Fire Stations in Nelson and Munsonville (responsibility shared with the Fire Chief)

In that role, the Buildings Committee evaluates building issues, recommends projects, reviews bids when appropriate, and makes recommendations to the Selectboard. In addition, the Buildings Committee provides information to the town's residents regarding large and/or complex projects. This information-sharing can take the form of public meetings, web pages, mailings, and other appropriate formats.

On September 28, 2022, the Selectboard dissolved the Nelson Town Buildings Committee and requested that committee members join a new Nelson Energy Committee.

# **Nelson Community Power Committee Report for 2022**

**Background:** Community Power programs are made possible by New Hampshire's Community Power law RSA 53-E. Community Power programs allow for bulk purchasing of electricity, which has the potential to help ratepayers save on their electric bills. These programs can also give individuals options to purchase a higher percentage of renewable energy as compared to the State's Renewable Portfolio Standard. Eversource will continue to own and operate the local distribution systems (poles and wires), deliver electricity to all Nelson ratepayers, and maintain restoration efforts after power outages. If community power aggregation moves forward in Nelson, individuals will have the choice to opt out at any time.

**Report:** The Nelson Board of Selectmen voted to form a Community Power Committee in October of 2021 and the membership was approved on December 1, 2021: Chair, Patsy Beffa-Negrini, Mare-Anne Jarvela, Sandy Mackenzie, Jonathan Pfister, Gary Robinson, Greg Rothman, Lisa Sieverts, Betsy Street, and Bill Waterston as voting members; and nonresident, Rick Weyerhaeuser, as an advisory, non-voting, member. The committee met approximately twice a month during 2022 and worked on the following:

- Gathered information about community power aggregation from other towns in the region that were writing electric aggregation plans (EAPs.): Keene, Marlborough, Swanzey, Harrisville, and Peterborough. Each of these cities/towns has subsequently had their EAPs approved/passed at their town meetings and approved by the NH Public Utilities Commission (PUC).
- Met with energy procurement consultants from Standard Power, the Community Power Coalition of NH, and Colonial Power Group.
- Attended meetings with Southwest Regional Planning Commission (SWRPC) and the Monadnock Sustainability
  Hub (MSH). Three members of the Nelson Community Power Committee attended an information and sharing
  session with SWRPC and MSH at the Keene Public Library on June 7th, 2022. During that meeting, we learned of
  Cheshire Community Power, which had recently been established due to an amendment in RSA 53-A that allows
  community power aggregation by county.
- Developed a brochure with basic information about community power aggregation and a survey (73 responses received to date) to gather input on Nelson ratepayers' goals, thoughts, and preferences for the plan.
- Educated Nelson residents during public events (Nubanusit Lake Association Meeting, Artisan's Craft Fair, Old Home Day, Nelson in Common Annual Board Meeting), through the Nelson Community Power website <a href="https://bit.ly/3QyOGJG">https://bit.ly/3QyOGJG</a> in the *Black Fly Express*, and by word of mouth.

During June, July, and August the committee worked on writing a draft Electric Aggregation Plan (EAP) for Nelson. The committee compared its draft Electric Aggregation Plan to the Cheshire County Electric Aggregation Plan. Following that comparison and performing a risk/benefit analysis, the Nelson Committee voted to recommend to the Select Board that it is in the best interest of the Town and Nelson ratepayers to join Cheshire Community Power, rather than initiate our own Nelson EAP, once the county plan is approved by the PUC.

# 2022 Fire Warden's Report

We started off the year with a few changes. We added a few more individuals to help out with writing enforcing of permits. The Warden position for the town becoming vacant and needing to be filled. Having been a Deputy Warden for a few years, I was willing to step up to the challenge. I have been working with the Forest Ranger assigned to our area, our Deputy Wardens and Issuing Agents closely to make sure that everything is being done correctly. As of now the town has four Deputy Wardens and One Issuing Agent.

The best way for anyone looking to get a permit is to contact the town office. Once a request is submitted, a member of my team will contact you to see when they can inspect the burn location and write a permit pending what they determine. If there is any reason why a permit cannot be written you will be told what needs to be corrected or changed for the permit be issued. I have been trying to get our response to permit request down to no more than 2 days from the time we have been contacted to when we write a permit after having inspected the location. As with all this, this is not perfect and things can go wrong or scheduling just doesn't work out.

# It is unlawful to...

- Burn brush or other materials when the ground is not covered by snow without a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
- · Burn in an outdoor fireplace without a fire permit.
- Kindle certain categories of fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except when raining. When raining, a fire permit is still required. Please check with your local Forest Fire Warden to determine allowable burning times.
- Kindle a fire for any purpose on land of another without written
  permission of the owner or owner's agent and a written permit from the
  Forest Fire Warden of the town, except in authorized recreational areas
  where suitable fireplaces are approved by the Forest Fire Warden.
- · Fail to totally extinguish any fire before leaving it.
- Discard matches, cigarettes or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.
- Throw any flammable waste material on, near, or adjacent to a public highway or private way in or near woodlands.
- Fail to report a forest or brush fire or fail to respond to a Forest Fire Warden's call for assistance.

Violations of the law (RSA 227-L) are subject to the following penalties:

Violation - May be fined up to \$1,000

**Misdemeanor** - May be fined up to \$2,000 or imprisoned up to one year or both.

All burning must be conducted in accordance with state laws, state rules, local ordinances and under a "Permit To Kindle Fire" issued by the local Fire Warden or authorized agent.

# Materials Not Acceptable for Burning:

- Construction & demolition debris
- Tires
- Household trash
- Packaging materials
- Plastics
- Coated or laminated paper
- Coated or treated cardboard
- Oily rags
- Animal, vegetable and kitchen waste
- Used Oil, gasoline and hazardous waste
- Brush greater than 5 inches in diameter
- Any wood that has been painted/stained, glued, or treated in any way

# Materials Acceptable for Burning:

- Campfire wood
- Charcoal
- Clean pallets

# If generated on-site

- Brush (less than 5 inches in diameter)
- Clean lumber scraps (private single family residences only)

### 2021 NELSON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

First I would like to introduce myself, my name is Joseph Sarcione and I am the new appointed Fire Chief for the Town of Nelson. I have been involved with the fire service since 1973 starting with the Stoddard Fire Department as their training office working up to the Deputy Fire Chief's position for a number of years. I held the positions of Forest Fire Warden, Special Deputy Forest Fire Warden and currently still teaching as a Fire Instructor for the Fire Academy as an Instructor for numerous years. Also I serve as the Deputy Fire Chief for the Marlow Fire and EMS Department. I enjoy teaching around the state basic Wildland Firefighting for the Fire Academy.

I want to take a moment to thank all the men and women of the Nelson Fire and Rescue Department for all their very hard work and time that they have put in and to their families as it is a huge undertaking to not only get their certification's, but the ongoing training, meetings and work details that is much needed in order to make this department function well and as a team. I also would like to thank all those who have donated to the Nelson Fire and Rescue threw out the year.

This year was a challenging year, we focused on straightening out the fire station, getting the equipment reorganized and catching up on odds and ends as well as upgrading the office computer. We are also starting to restructure our files, By-Law and our Standard Operating Procedures. My officers now have certain responsibilities that they are responsible for such as. Operations, Training, Station Details, and Maintaining all equipment.

Part of our training is teaming up with other towns too in a joint effort learn how to work together as a team with each other's equipment. This year again worked with Marlow, Stoddard, Gilsum, Alstead and Lempster in a day long training learning proper hose deployment, portable pumping and relaying water in remote woodland areas. A couple of other trainings one with Eversource and their Fire and Wires program which drew in other departments for this very informative training. DART also provided training for us and other departments which helped everyone understand what is needed for patient transport and how to safely land the helicopter. Thank you to the Dart team for providing the helicopter and allowing everyone to get a firsthand look at what is inside of it.

We held a heroism night for two young men ages 16 and 19 from Hillsboro who without any regards for their own safety rescued an individual from a burning vehicle on RTE9. These two young men were awarded certificates from the fire department with life safety pins, and certificates from the Board of Selectman.

At this time on behalf of the Fire Department and myself I would like to give a huge thank you to Edie Drinkwater for all her hard work and efforts in organizing and getting grants for us which not only helped us but also saved the town money that they would have had to come up with for all the Personnel Protective Gear, which needed to be replaced. We also were able to buy a set of Auto Extrication Cutters and Spreaders. Training on these vital tools will be in the near future before being placed in service.

Congratulations to Jenn Wells for completing her EMT certification. Jenn also has a back ground as a full-time nurse. And Hayden Sarcione for completing his New Hampshire State Firefighter One Certification.

One of the calls we had this year was a rain and wind event this past summer which took down many trees and wires mostly in the Tolman Pond area and some around different parts of the town. During this event we encountered 11 back to back calls which keep the department very busy making sure that the community was safe and that all down wires got reported to the hub threw Fire Mutual Aid for Eversource.

With the shortage of fire and rescue personal we are always looking for new members to join our team. We are currently working as a call department with an hourly rate for calls. Any and all training is provided by the department at no cost to you. I encourage anyone at any time to come down to the department and look around sit down with myself or any one of my officers and ask questions about joining the team.

This year the department responded to 94 calls: 46 EMS calls, 6 Motor Vehicle calls, 4 False Alarms, 16 Power Line Down calls, 1 LP Gas Leak, 2 Service Calls, 1 Chimney Fire, 1 Brush Fire, 15 Fire Calls, 2 Search / Rescue Calls.

# **Granite Lake Village District Annual Meeting. April 9, 2022**

Present: Commissioners: Butch Roeder, Vic Pepin, Derek MacAllister. Treasurer, Bob Maden;

Clerk, Sally Ripley.

Absent: John Halter, Moderator

Acting as moderator, Bob Maden called the meeting to order at 10:02 pm, and introduced the officers and began reading the warrant.

1. To choose one commissioner for a term of three years and to see if the inhabitants of the District will elect for the office of Clerk, Moderator, and Treasurer, each for a term of one year. The following people are nominated: Butch Roeder, Commissioner; Sally Ripley, Clerk; John Halter, Moderator; Bob Maden, Treasurer.

A motion to elect was appropriately made and seconded. The vote was unanimous to elect the slate of candidates.

2. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for dam maintenance/ repairs/ replacement established Dec. 2008. Commissioners recommend passage of this article. (majority voted required) Discussion:

Dave Pagniucci asked how much we have already in the capital reserve fund. The treasurer, Bob Maden, reported that we have \$125.000. If passed, it will be \$165.000. Butch spoke to the high-risk dam rating and its being our responsibility to care for the dam. We need to be prepared for eventual repairs; the engineering costs for a study and oversight for repairs of the dam in Winchester is running \$165,000, and repair cost will be additional to this.

Bob Maden said that in 8-10 years the commissioners would like to have a half million. Nelson's rate for the district might increase about double (from \$25./100K to \$50./100K). If we needed money now or above the amount in the reserve fund we have we could get a construction loan, or pass a bond measure.

Bill Steiniger added that the dam inspector 2 years ago said we were ok now, but he worried about any catastrophic flood. 9.5 billion gallons sitting behind the dam. (The state has raised the ratings of many other dams because of extreme weather events.)

In response to a question about the planned repairs to the culvert under West Shore Rd., Bob said that Nelson does not intend to change the flow of water in the culvert when they repair it. Nick Nicoletti asked about the jurisdiction over the culvert. Bob said we have none, only own the dam and control of its flow. Last July the gate was open all of July and we were worried the summer boards might fail.

A motion was appropriately made and seconded to pass article 2. The article passed unanimously.

3. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4360 for Village District expenses. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. (Majority vote required).

A motion to accept was appropriately made and seconded to pass article 3. The article passed unanimously.

4. To see if the District will vote to hold its next annual meeting April 15, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. at the Chapel-by-the-Lake, in Munsonville, NH.

A motion to accept was appropriately made and seconded to pass article 4. The article passed unanimously.

The first session of official ballot voting was ended at 10:28 a.m., and the second session for all other business was opened.

Dave Pagniucci addressed the meeting. He would like to have the water drawn down the 5 feet that it used to be about 20 years ago. Bob Maden thought there may be a permitting issue. Butch Roeder mentioned that a former commissioner had expressed concerns raised by NH DES regarding the fish and amphibians with a large draw down, but that he would be happy to explore the matter. A motion was appropriately made and seconded to have the commissioners investigate any regulatory or permitting issues with a large draw down, undertake a review, and make a recommendation on this matter no later than next annual meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

Bob Englund expressed concerns for water quality with the large number of people, mostly children, who used the beach at the cove. He said there had been a porta-potty in the cove for beach-users. It has been absent for years. Apparently it was tipped over and a large mess ensued. It had not been replaced. Mario Enzler, who owns the beach rights for the homeowners on Aten Rd., said he would not replace it. Maybe we could send a letter urging him to put it back. Bob Maden noted that this matter was outside the responsibility of the village district and suggested that the issue be brought up at the lake association meeting.

Bill Steiniger talked about all the sediment that has come down the inlet brook.

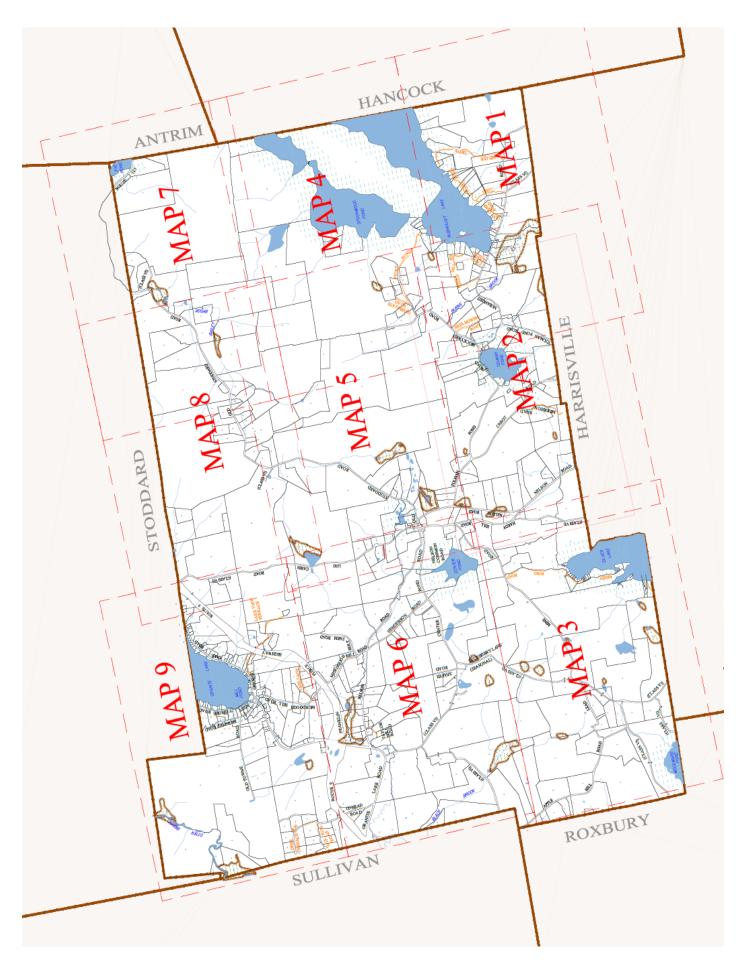

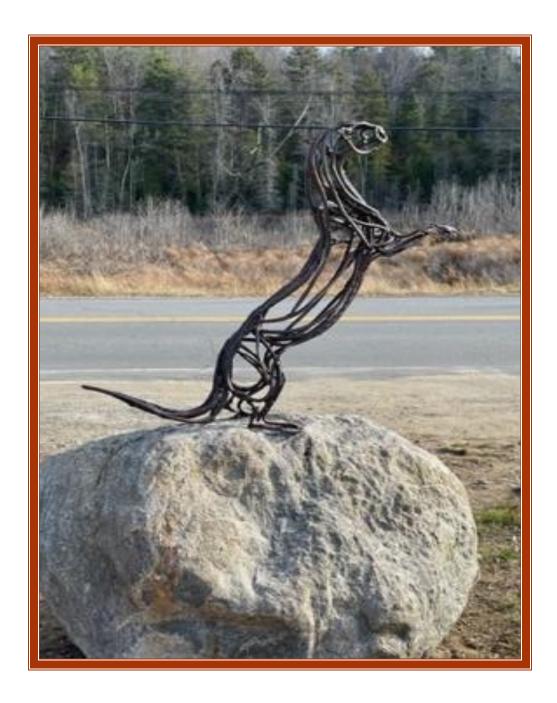
